WHEREAS, the Putnam County Sheriff's Department has requested permission to apply to the NYS Division of Homeland Security and Emergency Services (DHSES) for a grant under the FY2018 Explosive Detection Canine (EDC) Team Grant Program to sustain the County's EDC Team which requires no matching funds; and

WHEREAS, the award received could yield up to \$15,000 and would be used to support and maintain established Explosive Detection Canine (EDC) Teams and purchase new training and K-9 vehicle equipment; and

WHEREAS, the grant application requires the applicant to have express authority to submit on behalf of its agency; and

WHEREAS, the deadline to apply for a grant under this program is May 29, 2019; and

WHEREAS, the Protective Services Committee has reviewed and approved of this grant application; now therefore be it

RESOLVED, that the Putnam County Legislature supports and authorizes the Putnam County Sheriff's Department to apply for a \$15,000 grant under the FY2018 Explosive Detection Canine Team Grant Program.

# ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT & ENERGY COMMITTEE (Chairwoman Sayegh, Legislators Addonizio & Montgomery)

Item #5g – Approval/ Climate Smart Communities Pledge was next. Chairman Castellano recognized Legislator Sayegh, Chairwoman of the Economic Development & Energy Committee. On behalf of the members of the Committee, Legislators Addonizio and Montgomery, Legislator Sayegh moved the following:

Legislator Albano explained that during the Capital Projects meetings every month there is a lot of attention spent on conservation and energy. He stated that there is an Article 9 right now to renew all of the County's facitilities in a more energy efficient way.

Legislator Sayegh explained that the County does a lot of work on behalf of our constituents to save money and energy. She stated that last year we voted on transferring our diesel transportation vehicles to regular unleaded vehicles which is

better for air quality. She stated that she attended a Capital Projects meeting where there was discussion on the possibility of solar vehicles in the future and hydrothermal and solar at Tilly Foster Farm. She stated that she likes the idea of passing something that lets everyone know that this is a priority for the County and what the County has put forward already. She stated that the County will continue to work for these types of initiatives on behalf of our taxpayers.

Legislator Sullivan stated that over the years the County has looked at ways to save energy and to reduce our carbon footprint such as; LED lighting, solar panels, electric cars and hydrogen fuel. He stated that it was important to continue to make Putnam County a climate smart place to live and reduce the possible threats for our health, wellbeing and to try and stabilize the climate such as; air pollution or temperatures rising etc.

Legislator Nacerino concurred. She stated that we have taken on these initiatives and have been cognizant of energy and cost saving measures. She stated that this pledge puts us on the map in terms of letting everyone know what we have done and will continue to do to protect our environment.

Legislator Addonizio stated that Putnam County has always moved forward with initiatives that are beneficial to our community. She stated that we are very cognizant of what is happening with regard to climate change. She stated that she is in favor of this pledge consisting of 10 elements. She stated that Putnam County is already implementing many of those elements through clean and efficient energy. She stated that she would also like everyone to be aware that this would be a 50/50 grant match for Putnam County.

Legislator Gouldman explained that Putnam County has been in the forefront in looking at ways to help the environment. We have taken actions needed to address energy conservation. He stated that taking this pledge is the next step in what we have been doing and he stated that he would support this.

Legislator Montgomery thanked the Legislature for the healthy discussions back and forth on this topic to raise awareness which she explained was a trend across the State. She explained some of the signs of climate changes that are occurring now. She believed this initiative was a positive step in taking local action to reduce greenhouse gases and emissions. She stated that there were a lot of people in support of this initiative. She recognized the individual's names that sent correspondence to the Legislature in favor of Climate Smart. She stated that she was excited to adopt this pledge and get to work on this.

Legislator Jonke commended Legislator Albano for all the work he has done over the years in trying to make our County buildings run more efficiently. He stated that he is in favor of the pledge. He stated that it acknowledges the work that Putnam County has done to make their facilities run more efficiently over the last several years.

Legislator Montgomery stated that last year the New York State Department of Environmental Conservation (DEC) made more than \$9 million in climate funding available to New York municipalities. She stated that there are 261 communities registered for the Climate Smart Program; in Putnam it included the Town of Philipstown,

Village of Nelsonville and Village of Cold Spring. She stated that 20 have received the bronze certification.

Chairman Castellano stated that he is happy this is moving forward.

Chairman Castellano called for a Roll Call Vote.

Legislator Albano offered the following resolution and moved its adoption:

BOND RESOLUTION OF THE COUNTY OF PUTNAM, NEW YORK, ADOPTED JUNE 4, 2019, AUTHORIZING THE REHABILITATION OF PORTIONS OF PEEKSKILL HOLLOW ROAD AND RELATED BRIDGE IMPROVEMENTS AND/OR REHABILITATIONS; STATING THE ESTIMATED MAXIMUM COST THEREOF IS \$9,006,000; APPROPRIATING SAID AMOUNT THEREFOR, INCLUDING THE EXPENDITUE OF APPROXIMATELY \$7,205,000 IN GRANT FUNDS EXPECTED TO BE RECEIVED; AND AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE OF \$1,801,000 SERIAL BONDS OF SAID COUNTY TO FINANCE THE BALANCE OF SAID APPROPRIATION.

THE COUNTY LEGISLATURE OF THE COUNTY OF PUTNAM, NEW YORK, HEREBY RESOLVES (by the favorable vote of not less than two-thirds of all the members of said Legislature) AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. The County of Putnam, New York (herein called "County"), is hereby authorized to rehabilitate portions of Peekskill Hollow Road and related bridge improvements and/or rehabilitations, including, but not limited to, road realignments, full-depth reconstruction, drainage and guiderail improvements, bridge widening and/or deck and superstructure replacement, and all ancillary and related site, demolition and other work required in connection therewith (the "Project"). The estimated maximum cost thereof, including preliminary costs and costs incidental thereto and to the financing thereof, is \$9,006,000, and said amount is hereby appropriated therefor, including the appropriation of \$7,205,000 in anticipated Federal grant funds. The plan of financing, includes the expenditure of said grant funds and the issuance of \$1,801,000 serial bonds of the County to finance the balance of said appropriation, and the levy and collection of taxes on all the taxable real property in the County to pay the principal of said bonds and the interest thereon as the same shall become due and payable.

Section 2. Bonds of the County in the principal amount of \$1,801,000 are hereby authorized to be issued pursuant to the provisions of the Local Finance Law, constituting Chapter 33-a of the Consolidated Laws of the State of New York (herein called "Law"), to finance a portion of said appropriation.

Section 3. The period of probable usefulness of the object or purpose for which said bonds are authorized to be issued, within the limitations of Section 11.00 a. 91 of the Law, is fifteen (15) years.

Section 4. The proceeds of the bonds herein authorized and any bond anticipation notes issued in anticipation of said bonds may be applied to reimburse the County for expenditures made after the effective date of this resolution for the purpose for which said bonds are authorized. The foregoing statement of intent with respect to reimbursement is made in conformity with Treasury Regulation Section 1.150-2 of the United States Treasury Department.

Section 5. Each of the bonds authorized by this resolution, and any bond anticipation notes issued in anticipation of the sale of said bonds, shall contain the recital of validity as prescribed by Section 52.00 of the Law and said bonds, and any

notes issued in anticipation of said bonds, shall be general obligations of the County, payable as to both principal and interest by general tax upon all the taxable real property within the County. The faith and credit of the County are hereby irrevocably pledged to the punctual payment of the principal of and interest on said bonds, and any notes issued in anticipation of the sale of said bonds, and provision shall be made annually in the budget of the County by appropriation for (a) the amortization and redemption of the bonds and any notes in anticipation thereof to mature in such year and (b) the payment of interest to be due and payable in such year.

Section 6. Subject to the provisions of this resolution and of the Law and pursuant to the provisions of Section 21.00 relative to the authorization of the issuance of bonds having substantially level or declining annual debt service, Section 30.00 relative to the authorization of the issuance of bond anticipation notes or the renewals thereof, and Sections 50.00, 56.00 to 60.00 and 168.00 of the Law, the powers and duties of the County Legislature relative to authorizing bond anticipation notes, or the renewals thereof, and relative to providing for substantially level or declining annual debt service, and prescribing the terms, form and contents, and as to the sale and issuance of the bonds herein authorized, and of any bond anticipation notes issued in anticipation of said bonds, and the renewals of said notes, as well as to executing agreements for credit enhancements, are hereby delegated to the Commissioner of Finance, the chief fiscal officer of the County.

Section 7. The validity of the bonds authorized by this resolution, and of any notes issued in anticipation of the sale of said bonds, may be contested only if:

- (a) such obligations are authorized for an object or purpose for which the County is not authorized to expend money, or
- (b) the provisions of law which should be complied with at the date of the publication of such resolution, or a summary thereof, are not substantially complied with,

and an action, suit or proceeding contesting such validity is commenced within twenty days after the date of such publication, or

(c) such obligations are authorized in violation of the provisions of the constitution.

Section 8. Legislator Montgomery explained that we approved the purchase of the Percheron horses that will go into the barn based on information received from the County Executive that there will be an animal science program starting in September. She explained that she found out that it is an animal care program and there is no place for this program at Tilly Foster Farm right now. She stated that we are talking about an additional \$125,000 for the barn and the classroom cannot go in the barn. She stated that based on other discussions regarding cutting programs and personnel in the County, she could not vote for improvement that would have no impact.

Legislator Albano stated that this work on the barn is not related to the horses in any way. He stated that the primary issue is that the barn is in need of renovations and structural work. He stated that this is one (1) step in the direction of what the barn could be used for in the future. He explained the need to do repairs on the foundation, floor and outside of the building to keep the barn structurally safe.

Legislator Montgomery stated the need for education space for the animal care program.

Legislator Sayegh believed there was also the potential of having the Putnam Arts Council housed at the barn as well. She stated that the building is in desperate need of repair.

Chairman Castellano stated that Tilly Foster Farm is a tremendous property in Putnam County and he was happy that we have rebuilt a large portion of it. He believed this was the next step in moving the property forward for the future.

Legislator Albano explained that there was also the potential to receive grant funding. He stated that if they are received the funding would be placed back in the Capital Project account.

Legislator Nacerino stated that by Resolution #82 of 2019 we approved the allocation for this Capital Project to begin. She stated that this renovation has nothing to do with the horses or the program. She explained that the program was highlighted during the purchase of the horses, however it was not the sole reason why the horses were purchased.

Legislator Sullivan explained that the funding is coming from money that has been designated for Capital Projects to improve infrastructure in the County. It is not funding set aside for operations or personnel.

Legislator Montgomery apologized for co-mingling the separate issues. She stated that this was her way of pointing out issues that were not clear early on when the horses were voted on. She explained that when she toured Tilly Foster Farm with the BOCES representative, who was excited about the animal care program, and here we are in June and still do not have space for the program. She stated that she cannot vote for more money going into Tilly Foster.

Legislator Addonizio stated that there were many classrooms downstairs at the main building at Tilly Foster which she believed BOCES would be utilizing.
