Maloney attempted the Heimlich maneuver on the student and when she realized his backpack was in the way, it was removed and DiLeo took over while Maloney directed the rest of the students out of the classroom and into the gym; and

WHEREAS, Another student Abby, who was also in the classroom, followed her instincts and instead of going to the gym went straight to the Nurse's office to notify the nurse of the situation. She then led the nurse back to the classroom where the choking student was being helped by the teachers; and

WHEREAS, Thankfully, the Heimlich maneuver quickly worked to dislodge the candy, allowing the boy to begin breathing before the nurse arrived to the classroom. Thanks to the quick actions of his fellow students and caring teachers, the student has fully recovered and is doing well; now therefore be it

He explained that there is very little parking for the property, it is mostly street parking. He explained that if we could get this appraised value, as is, without having to grant a right of way he stated that he would be in favor of selling it. He stated that he would like to keep an eye on how this transpires down the road.

Legislator Montgomery stated that she was not ready to vote yes on selling this either. She believed that in light of what is happening in the world today and the need for more services, while she would like to see more services on the west side of the County, she believed that we did not know what services would be needed in the future.

Legislator Sullivan stated that as a conservative Republican, he was always looking for ways to shrink the size of government and reduce the tax burden on our taxpayers. He stated that this building has been vacant from the County for over five (5) years. He stated that it is in significant disrepair and would require a significant investment by the County to get it up to working order. He stated that by selling it for \$600,000 was a very good price. It would be back on the tax rolls. He stated that it is located in the Hamlet of Carmel, and it is a building that would have a lot of value for someone with the right use.

Legislator Albano stated that before we sell the property, we should consider deed restrictions on the sale. He stated that we should consider what could be put in there since it is in the Hamlet of Carmel.

Legislator Nacerino stated that she wanted to echo Legislator Jonke's comments. She stated that she too feels conflicted. She stated that this is a pristine piece of property located in the Hamlet. She stated that she does not want to be short sighted in selling this and then regret it years from now. However, if the sale price of \$600,000 comes through, she believed that would certainly be a strong consideration. She stated that in the nine (9) years that she has been on the Legislature, she believed the building was vacant and in disrepair. She believed that we should see whether there is an opportunity for someone to make that space viable. She stated that she would support moving forward with the sale for the right price.

Chairwoman Addonizio concurred. She stated that the comparable sales analysis does show \$630,000. She stated, as Legislator Jonke mentioned, if we can get that amount, she believed the Legislature would support the sale.

WHEREAS, after review of the one proposal submitted in response to the Request for Proposal the Legislature recommended contracting with Altieri & Firriolo, P.L.L.C. for personal services, encompassed in the terms as specified in the Request for Proposal; now therefore be it

RESOLVED, that the Putnam County Legislature designates Altieri & Firriolo, P.L.L.C. for outside services encompassing the terms as specified in the Request for Proposal for a price not to exceed \$84,000 for the year 2022; and be it further

RESOLVED, that the contract term shall run from January 1, 2022 through December 31, 2024.

BY POLL VOTE: ALL AYES. CARRIED UNANIMOUSLY.

Item #6LL – Approval/ Litigation Settlement/ Rosado v. County of Putnam was next. On behalf of the members of the Rules, Enactments & Intergovernmental Relations Committee, Legislators Albano and Castellano, Legislator Sullivan moved the following:

Legislator Sullivan explained the litigation claim. He explained that due to the potential significant monetary impact to the taxpayers, the County Attorney recommended the proposed settlement of \$125,000 to the Legislature. He explained that the behavior involving this case was unacceptable and we look forward to working next year with our new Sheriff, having a strong approach that these things do not happen in the future.

Legislator Montgomery believed that Legislator Sullivan's comments somehow reflect that the current Sheriff is responsible of the behavior of the two (2) officers involved in this case. She believed it was inappropriate. She believed it was wrong to say that it would not happen again.

Legislator Jonke stated that settling lawsuits was not easy. He explained that the Legislature has to balance the potential fiscal impact with an adverse decision against the County which could end up costing the County much more than the settlement amount. He stated that in no way are we condoning the behavior of the officers, and we are hoping that something would be done to educate all the officers that this type of behavior could potentially put us in this situation. He explained that these are difficult decisions, however, the fiscally prudent decision is to settle this case at this amount.

Legislator Sayegh clarified that these are alleged actions which have not been litigated in a Court of Law. She explained that the Legislature's job is to follow the advice of our attorneys and settle this case. She stated that these are alleged actions and did not want to throw any officers under the bus for anything, but at the same time she certainly did not condone any activity like this.

Legislator Gouldman concurred with Legislator Jonke. He stated that this is a fiscal decision. He explained that if we do not settle this case, the fiscal impact could be greater if it went to trial.

Legislator Nacerino stated that she would be voting for this as well. She stated that recognizing and clearly understanding that the fiscal impact could be adverse should we

not move forward with this. She stated we also need to understand and reflect the need for some culpability to prevent these types of cases coming forward. She stated that this is not a reflection on one (1) person or the Sheriff.

RESOLUTION #285

APPROVAL/ LITIGATION SETTLEMENT/ ROSADO V. COUNTY OF PUTNAM

WHEREAS, on or about May 9, 2019, the Plaintiff, Louis Rosado, was involved in a traffic stop, wherein he alleged that the responding officers used excessive force and subsequently commenced a Civil Rights Action in the Supreme Court for the County of Putnam against the Putnam County Sheriff's Department, the County of Putnam, Officer William Rossiter and the Town of Putnam Valley claiming use of excessive force, negligent supervision abuse of authority, and; and

WHEREAS, Plaintiff sought recovery for compensatory damages in an undetermined amount, as well as costs, disbursements, attorney's fees and interest; and

WHEREAS, the Claims Committee for the New York Municipal Insurance Reciprocal (NYMIR) recently arrived at a settlement value for this case of one hundred and fifty thousand (\$150,000.00) dollars; and

WHEREAS, Plaintiff agreed to a settlement with the County, subject to the Legislature's approval, in which the County agreed to pay Plaintiff the sum of one hundred and twenty-five thousand (\$125,000.00) dollars; and

WHEREAS, the County Attorney, the County's outside counsel, James A. Randazzo, and NYMIR's claims representative recommended the settlement as an alternative to trial; and

WHEREAS, counsel for the County of Putnam has in fact settled the matter with the Plaintiffs for the sum of one hundred and twenty-five thousand (\$125,000.00) dollars, and the Plaintiff has executed the required Settlement Agreement and General Release which, upon approval by the Legislature will be filed with the Court, thereby discontinuing this matter and allowing the Plaintiff to receive his settlement payment; and

WHEREAS, the settlement is in the public interest and has avoided the costs of attorney's fees and further litigation; now therefore be it

RESOLVED, that the settlement of this matter for the sum of one hundred and twenty-five thousand (\$125,000.00) dollars is hereby approved.

RESOLUTION #286

APPROVAL/ LOCAL LAW TO AMEND THE CODE OF THE COUNTY OF PUTNAM CHAPTER 135, ENTITLED "CONTRACTORS"

Be it enacted by the Legislature of the County of Putnam as follows:

Section I.

Section 135-4 of the Code of Putnam County is hereby amended to read as follows:

§ 135-4 Definitions.

As used in this chapter, the following terms shall have the meanings indicated:

APPEARANCE TICKET

A written notice issued and subscribed by the Director of Consumer Affairs, or his or her designee, directing a person to appear at a designated future time in connection with the alleged commission of a violation of this chapter. A notice conforming to such definition constitutes an appearance ticket even if referred to by any other name or title.

BOARD

The Board of Home Improvement Contractors of Putnam County, as provided by this chapter.

CUSTOM HOME

A new single-family residence to be constructed on premises owned of record by the purchaser at the time of contract, provided that such residence is intended for residential occupancy by such purchaser and the contract of sale is entered into on or after the first day of March, nineteen hundred ninety.

DIRECTOR

The Director of the Putnam County Office of Consumer Affairs/Weights and Measures/Trades Licensing and Registration.

FIXED MEMBERSHIP

A specific number of memberships established in the rules governing an organization. Specifically, the fixed membership of the Board of Home Improvement Contractors is nine (9), including filled and unfilled positions.

HOME IMPROVEMENT

- A. The repair, replacement, remodeling, refinishing, installation, construction, alteration, conversion, modernization, beautification, maintenance, improvement, or addition to a parcel of land designated by a tax map number or a building or that portion thereof which is used or designed to be used as a private residence apartment or dwelling place, including, but not limited to:
 - (1) Asphalt or blacktop or driveway sealing.
 - (2) Landscaping and gardening.
 - (3) Arboriculture.
 - (4) Lawn mowing/ground maintenance/leaf blowing. (Note: shall not apply to full-time students under the age of 22 engaged in seasonal or part-time employment and who do not have employees.)

(5)	Swimming pools.
(6)	Porches, patios, terraces, decks, retaining walls, and any other outdoor stonework.
(7)	Garages and garage doors.
(8)	Central vacuum cleaning systems.
(9)	Windows, doors, and skylights.
(10)	Septic systems.
(11)	Insulation.
(12)	Waterproofing.
(13)	Tiling.
(14)	Fencing.
(15)	Painting and wall coverings.
(16)	Flooring and wall-to-wall carpeting.
(17)	Masonry.
(18)	Roofing.
(19)	Awnings or siding.
(20)	Antennas or satellite dishes.
(21)	Carpentry.
(22)	Excavation.
(23)	Environmental reclamation.
(24)	Other interior or exterior improvements.
(25)	Window and door treatments.
(26)	Solar panels.
(27)	Gutters and leaders.
(28)	Chimney cleaning, installation, and repairs.
(29)	Drywall and taping.

- (30) Air duct cleaning.
- (31) Pressure washing.
- B. "Home improvement" shall also mean the construction of a custom home, installation of home improvement goods, or furnishing of home improvement services.

HOME IMPROVEMENT BUSINESS

The business of providing a home improvement to an owner for a profit, fee, remuneration, favor, or as part of a barter agreement. For purposes of this chapter, a "barter agreement" is defined as an exchange of things (such as products or services) for other things instead of for money.

HOME IMPROVEMENT CONTRACT

An agreement for the performance of home improvement, between a home improvement contractor and an owner, and where the contract price specified exceeds five hundred dollars.

HOME IMPROVEMENT CONTRACTOR

Any person, firm, or corporation who owns, operates, maintains, controls, transacts, or conducts a home improvement business or who undertakes or advertises a home improvement service, or offers to undertake or agrees to perform any home improvement for the owner for a fee, remuneration, favor, or as part of a barter agreement, and whether or not such person is a prime contractor, or subcontractor with respect to the owner, other than a bona fide employee of the registrant. "Home improvement contractor" does not include a person, firm, corporation, landlord, cooperative corporation, condominium board of managers, joint tenant, or cotenant that owns, in whole or in part, the property to be improved.

LEGISLATURE

The Putnam County Legislature.

NOTICE OF CHARGES

A written notice setting forth the particulars of the alleged violation(s) of this chapter, the date and time of the hearing, and the hearing procedures set out in §135-22(B)(1).

OWNER

Any homeowner, tenant, or any other person who orders, contracts for, or purchases a home improvement or the service of a contractor, or the person entitled to the performance of the work of a contractor pursuant to a home improvement contract.

PERSON

For purposes of this chapter, the term "person" shall include an individual, partnership, corporation, business organization, or other similar legal entity.

REGISTRANT

A person registered and authorized to engage in the home improvement business under the provisions of this chapter.

SUBCONTRACTOR

A person, other than a supplier of materials, laborer, or bona fide employee of a contractor, who enters into a contract, written or verbal, with a contractor for the performance of any part of the contractor's contract, or a subcontractor's contract, as the case may be, and who does not perform work other than as a subcontractor.

SUBSTANTIAL EVIDENCE

Evidence that a reasonable mind could accept as adequate to support a conclusion; evidence beyond a scintilla.

Section II.

Section 135-6 of the Code of Putnam County is hereby amended to read as follows:

§ 135-6 Board of Home Improvement.

- a. Board established. There shall be a Board of Home Improvement Contractors ("Board" or "Home Improvement Board") consisting of nine members, each of whom shall be a resident of the County or own a business within the County. (See definition of "fixed membership" in § 135-4.)
- b. The Board shall interview all candidates for Board membership and submit its recommendations with all candidates' résumés to the Legislature.
- c. Board members shall be appointed by a majority vote of the Legislature. Board members shall serve a term of two years and at the pleasure of the Legislature.
- d. Composition of Board. The composition of the Board primarily shall be a representative group of people with home improvement trade experience who are actively engaged or retired from the trade. The Board shall also include those who have no home improvement trade experience at all. At no time, shall the composition of the Board interfere with the viability of the Board to perform its duties and to adhere to its responsibilities. A representative group may include:
 - A. Home improvement contractors.
 - B. Licensed engineers.
 - C. Registered architects.
 - D. Building inspectors.
 - E. Tradesmen.
 - F. Citizens independent of the home improvement business.
- e. Secretary. There shall be a Secretary to the Board who shall be appointed by the County Executive. The Secretary shall report to the Director of the Office of Consumer Affairs, Weights and Measures and Trades Licensing.

- f. Chairperson and Vice Chairperson. The Board, by majority vote of the fixed membership of the Board, shall elect a Chairperson and Vice Chairperson, each of whom shall serve a two-year term.
- g. Quorum. A majority of the fixed membership of the Board shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business. A quorum may be achieved by members attending in person or by Board-approved electronic means that allow for simultaneous visual and aural communication throughout the entire deliberative session.
- h. Voting. The basis for decisions by the Board shall be the majority vote by the fixed membership of the Board, i.e., five out of nine.
- Vacancies. In the event of a vacancy on the Board, the Board shall send its recommendation to the Legislature and the remainder of the vacating member's term shall be filled by appointment by the Legislature.
- j. Removal. A Board member, upon recommendation by the Board, may be removed by majority vote of the Legislature for misconduct or malfeasance in office, incompetence, incapacity, neglect of duty, chronic absenteeism, or other good and sufficient cause.

Section III.

Section 135-8 of the Code of Putnam County is hereby amended to read as follows:

- § 135-8 Registration required.
 - A. Registration required. Within the County of Putnam, no person shall engage in home improvement work or maintain, conduct, or operate a home improvement business as a general contractor, subcontractor, or contract employee, or hold himself or herself out as being able to do so, unless such person is registered pursuant to this chapter.
 - B. Exceptions.
 - (1) No registration shall be required of any person who performs labor or services for a contractor or subcontractor that is duly registered hereunder, and such person is classified as an employee, not an independent contractor, as defined by the Internal Revenue Service.
 - (2) A license issued by the Putnam County Plumbing Board or the Putnam County Board of Electrical Examiners shall be deemed a registration in compliance with this section for the benefit of the holder thereof to perform work within the scope of his or her profession.
 - C. Working while registration suspended, revoked, or expired.

- (1) Within the County of Putnam, no person shall engage in home improvement work or maintain, conduct, or operate a home improvement business as a general contractor, subcontractor, or contract employee, or hold himself or herself out as being able to do so, while his or her registration has been suspended or revoked by action of the Board.
- (2) Within the County of Putnam, no person shall engage in home improvement work or maintain, conduct, or operate a home improvement business as a general contractor, subcontractor, or contract employee, or hold himself or herself out as being able to do so, while his or her registration has expired.
- D. A person shall be deemed unregistered in violation of section A. above if that person performs home improvement work outside the scope of any registration issued pursuant to this chapter.

Section IV.

Section 135-10-a of the Code of Putnam County is hereby renumbered as follows:

§ 135-10.1 Hiring and duties.

Section V.

Section 135-10-b of the Code of Putnam County is hereby renumbered as follows:

§ 135-10.2 Denial of registration or renewal.

Section VI.

Section 135-21 of the Code of Putnam County is hereby amended to read as follows:

§ 135-21 Compliance enforcement officer.

- A. There shall be a Compliance Enforcement Officer(s) who shall report directly to the Director.
- B. Powers and duties. The Compliance Enforcement Officer shall have the following powers and duties:
 - (1) Investigations. Upon receipt of a complaint by any person alleging a violation of this chapter, or on his or her own initiative based on personal knowledge of a suspected violation, the Compliance Enforcement Officer may conduct any independent investigation necessary to carry out the provisions of this chapter. Pursuant to this power, the Compliance Enforcement Officer may:

- (a) Appearance tickets. Issue appearance tickets to alleged violators to compel their appearance before the Board. Such appearance tickets shall be in a form prescribed by the Board.
- (b) Subpoenas. Make recommendations to the Board to subpoena the appearance of witnesses to a duly-held hearing and/or to compel the production of any books, records, or documents that he or she may deem material and relevant for the proper prosecution of a violation.
- (2) Prosecutions. The Compliance Enforcement Officer shall be charged with the duty of presenting material and relevant evidence of alleged violation(s) of this chapter at a hearing duly convened by the Board in accordance with § 135-22 of this chapter. The Compliance Enforcement Officer shall designate an alternate to make the presentation to the Board in his/her absence. Such designated alternate shall not be a currently serving member of the Board.

Section VII.

Section 135-25 of the Code of Putnam County is hereby amended to read as follows:

§ 135-25 Insurance and bonding.

- A. Except for a business engaged in lawn mowing/ground maintenance/leaf blowing, prior to the issuance of any registration, permit, or renewal thereof and prior to performing any home improvement work in Putnam County a person must obtain insurance and bonding as follows:
 - (1) A license and permit bond in the amount of \$25,000;
 - (2) Workers' compensation insurance for all employees;
 - (3) General liability insurance of at least \$1,000,000 per occurrence and \$2,000,000 in the aggregate and the description of operations in the certificate of liability insurance shall contain the scope of work performed.
- B. A person must provide the Board with proof of insurance and bonding information before any registration, permit, or renewal thereof will be granted.
- C. Any home improvement work performed in Putnam County must fall within the scope of coverage of the insurance and bond policies required under section A. above.
- D. All insurance policies shall contain a provision of continued liability and name Putnam County as an additional insured and certificate holder.
- E. All bonds shall contain a provision identifying Putnam County as an obligee. Notwithstanding the foregoing, any payment issued on behalf of a claim for an

aggrieved individual or company, shall be paid directly to said individual or company by the bond company.

F. All insurance policies and bonds must be carried throughout the entire period of registration and for the duration of any home improvement work performed.

Section VIII.

This Local Law shall take effect immediately upon filing with the New York Secretary of State.

AUDIT & ADMINISTRATION COMMITTEE (Chairman Castellano, Legislators Albano & Gouldman)

Item #6rr – Approval/ Budgetary Amendment (21A095)/ Finance/ Putnam County Golf Course/ Contracts was next. Chairwoman Addonizio recognized Legislator Castellano, Chairman of the Audit & Administration Committee. On behalf of the members of the Committee, Legislators Albano and Gouldman, Legislator Castellano moved the following:

Legislator Montgomery thanked Legislative Clerk Schonfeld, County Auditor Alfano-Sharkey and Finance Commissioner Carlin for trying to clarify this for her. She believed the resolution was very vague. She was informed that these contracts are for everything that goes on at the Golf Course such as events, fundraisers, etc. She stated that she did not know who these contracts were for and believed in the future this needs to be broken down into categories. She stated that we have money collected for parking at events, beer trucks and food trucks at Tilly Foster Farm. She believed that we needed to do a better job making this clearer and not just label it "contracts."

Legislator Sullivan believed it was not all the things mentioned by Legislator Montgomery. He explained that the amendment in front of us is for Putnam Golf Course. He believed this was income due to an increase of activity of people playing golf. He did not believe it came from anything else other than the Golf Course. He stated that we could ask our County Auditor if she knows anything more than that.

County Auditor Alfano-Sharkey stated that it is an increase in activity.

Legislator Montgomery questioned what the activity was.

Legislator Sullivan stated that "contracts" was a heading for a line item.

Legislator Castellano stated that we have been told over the course of the year how well the Golf Course is doing, especially during the pandemic. He stated that obviously we have more golfers than before, therefore we are correcting the income. He stated that it is not just golfers in this category. It is the Putnam County Golf Course.

Legislator Sullivan believed that because of the pandemic, it was significantly just from golf because most of the other operations on the Golf Course were closed.

Legislator Montgomery questioned who we were signing contracts with for this.

Chairwoman Addonizio believed that the budget line was just worded "contracts."

Legislator Albano believed this could have been brought up at a Committee meeting. He believed that we were fortunate to have the Golf Course. He believed that during these crazy times it proved to be a positive opportunity for people as other businesses were closed. He explained that this budgetary reflected the increase of income based on the agreement we have with the people that do the Golf service.

Chairwoman Addonizio explained that the budgetary was an increase in appropriations and revenues.

Legislator Montgomery stated that it is a line item in the budget for "contracts." She stated that she is happy that we have extra income and wanted to know who the contracts are for and who signs them.

Legislator Sullivan stated that there is only one (1) person in the County that approves contracts and that is the County Executive. He stated that the budgetary is for the Golf Course for the additional rounds of golf played.

Chairwoman Addonizio stated that we could find out.

Legislator Jonke stated that we were apprised of the unusually high number of golf rounds.

Legislator Montgomery appreciated that. She stated what she understands now is that it is probably for additional golf rounds. She explained that she knows that events have taken place at the Golf Course since it re-opened and all she wanted to know was if the increase covered those activities as well.

Legislator Sayegh stated that this is income coming into the County and it is a benefit to the taxpayers. She stated that we received backup information that we will have a presentation from the Golf Course manager this month.

Legislator Nacerino stated that all Legislator Montgomery asked was that this memorandum be a little more detailed and indicate exactly what it is for. She stated that in the future that request should be carried out for all of us because none of us here can answer this question with any real knowledge of exactly what the content is defined as. So, to be able to define this and make it clearer on paper, would alleviate all of what has gone on here tonight.

Legislator Montgomery stated that in response to Legislator Sayegh, she likes to know exactly where the income is coming from especially when she is responsible for saving it on behalf of the taxpayers.

Chairwoman Addonizio stated that we will find out.

Item #6ss – Approval/ Budgetary Amendment (21A102)/ Tilly Foster Farm/ Utility Expenses was next. On behalf of the members of the Audit & Administration Committee, Legislators Albano and Gouldman, Legislator Castellano moved the following:

Legislator Montgomery stated that she understands that this is rental income, and we have an increase in utility services and costs, however we are renting sites at Tilly Foster Farm for low rent with utilities included. She stated that our tenants are increasing these utility costs. She explained that there is a facility being used right now with no lease. She stated that the County is paying those utilities, not even knowing what they are manufacturing or whether they are heating something all day long. She did not believe that we should be using this income to subsidize what we have already subsidized for a number of these spaces. She stated that if we have extra income, it should be used for services for the people and not giving more to our friends and family who are using our spaces at Tilly Foster Farm.

Legislator Sullivan stated that this was discussed at Committee. He stated that Tilly Foster Farm is a tremendous asset to the County. He did not know what Legislator Montgomery meant by "family and friends." He stated that the County is doing a great job at Tilly Foster Farm which is generating a significant income for the County. He explained how it is a tourist attraction and the many events that take place such as; concerts, weddings, restaurant, etc.

Legislator Montgomery stated that she has an outstanding memorandum to the County Executive and the Chairman of the Physical Services Committee regarding the relationship of one (1) of the tenants at Tilly Foster Farm.

Chairwoman Addonizio stated that was not on the agenda this evening.

Legislator Montgomery did not understand how we could responsibly approve this item when we do not know where these utility costs are coming from, especially when we have a facility being used without a signed lease or how much of the utilities they are utilizing for their business. Legislator Montgomery explained that there was another tenant paying low rent, and we were told that it was a good deal because they would also be watching over the facility, yet we have no employee contract in place for that. She stated that there was nothing in writing or a job description.

Legislator Albano believed this was quite simple. He stated that we are aware that utility costs have risen, and we are using income to pay these expenses. He believed that all the other questions should be addressed at a Committee meeting.

Legislator Nacerino concurred with Legislator Albano. She stated that we are all well aware that utility costs have increased, and we will continue to see those increases in the upcoming year. She stated that rental income used to offset some of the use for the facilities is not unique.

Legislator Sullivan stated that he was not sure what was being manufactured up at the farm.

Legislator Montgomery believed that they were making candles. She believed that the increase in utilities was due to the tenants that are using the utilities at already a reduced cost in rent. She believed that the income should go back to the taxpayers, and not as an additional benefit to the already reduced rent.

Chairwoman Addonizio stated that it does not mean that the increase is from the rentals.

Legislator Montgomery questioned who was using the utilities.

Legislator Castellano stated that there are other properties that we invest in there; the farm, restaurant, etc. He stated that heating oil has gone up. He explained that we are covering those costs which were unexpected with rental income.

Legislator Montgomery wished everyone a wonderful holiday season. She mentioned that there are two (2) long serving outgoing town supervisors that are retiring this month; Sam Oliverio, Jr. of Putnam Valley and Richard Shea of Philipstown, who collectively served for over one (1) half of a century. She thanked them both for their service and dedication and provided background on some of Supervisor Shea's accomplishments.

Legislator Gouldman stated that today was a very important day in American History, a day 80 years ago when Pearl Harbor was bombed. He thanked everyone who has served in the military. He explained that freedom is not free and the military who have served our Country are greatly appreciated. He congratulated Putnam Valley Supervisor Sam Oliverio, Jr. and Putnam Valley Highway Superintendent Larry Cobb on their retirement at the end of the month. He stated that he and Legislator Montgomery will be presenting them with a certificate at the next Putnam Valley Town Board meeting. He thanked them for the many years of service to the community. He wished everyone a happy holiday, Merry Christmas and Happy New Year.

Legislator Jonke stated that he would like to remember the 80th anniversary of the attack on Pearl Harbor, all the men and women who passed away that day, and those who continue fighting for our Country beginning with World War II. He stated that we should never forget that day. He stated he would also like to congratulate, with mixed emotions as a Mahopac High School graduate, the Carmel High School Football Team in taking the State Championship. She stated that today we pay tribute to those who paid the ultimate sacrifice for our freedom. She stated that it was exciting times for the Carmel High School Football Team. She hoped everyone could attend the parade for them this Saturday. She stated that this is the first time in Putnam County that any team has won the State Championship. She wished everyone a Merry Christmas and a healthy and happy December.
