WHEREAS, the Town of Southeast is the owner of a certain property located at 85 Lower Mine Road in the Town of Southeast, designated as Tax Map No. 78.-1-104, (hereinafter the "Property"); and

WHEREAS, the Town of Southeast has awarded a contract to Ameresco, Inc. to lease the Property and construct, through Ameresco, Inc.'s wholly owned subsidiary, Lower Mine Road LLC, a solar energy system on the Property (hereinafter the "Project"); and

WHEREAS, Lower Mine Road LLC represents the Project is a qualifying energy system, as defined by NY RPTL § 487(1)(a); and

WHEREAS, the Town of Southeast and the Brewster Central School District have entered into a PILOT agreement for the Project (hereinafter the "PILOT Agreement"), attached hereto as Schedule "A", with Lower Mine Road LLC as the developer of the Project; and

WHEREAS, the PILOT Agreement requires the County's approval to be finalized; and

WHEREAS, in the absence of said PILOT agreement, Lower Mine Road LLC may obtain the full statutory exemption, as set forth in RPTL § 487, and, by entering said PILOT Agreement, the County will ensure that it receives payments mitigating the potential lost tax revenue; and

WHEREAS, the County desires to assist the Town of Southeast in its efforts to increase renewable energy production; and

WHEREAS, the Putnam County Legislature has reviewed the PILOT Agreement and believes it to be beneficial to the County and the public, in that it will incentivize the increase of renewable energy production within the County; now therefore be it

RESOLVED, the Putnam County Legislature approves the PILOT Agreement and authorizes the County Executive to immediately execute same; and be it further

RESOLVED, that this Resolution shall take effect immediately.

Item #6r – Approval/ Local Law to Amend Article V of Chapter 220 of the Code of Putnam County by Increasing the Income Threshold of the Senior Citizen Property Tax Exemption was next. On behalf of the members of the Rules, Enactments & Intergovernmental Relations Committee, Legislators Nacerino and Sayegh, Legislator Addonizio moved the following:

Legislator Addonizio explained that by increasing the income threshold of the senior citizen property tax exemption, it will allow more senior residents in Putnam County to qualify for the exemption. She stated that we currently have 898 homeowners that would qualify. She explained that there will be a three (3) year phase in period.

Legislator Jonke explained that, as someone who has been involved in the property tax business for the last 34 years, he believed this would truly have a positive impact on our senior citizen population. He stated that more seniors will be able to qualify for more exemptions on their property taxes, which includes school, town and county taxes. He stated that this will be very helpful to the senior population.

Legislator Sayegh explained that Putnam County has one (1) of the highest percentages of senior population throughout all the counties in New York State. She stated that this will be helpful to those individuals, especially if social security benefits increase next year.

Chairman Sullivan stated that he was glad to see the change which will benefit our senior population.

Section 1.

§ 220-29 Exemption granted.

Pursuant to the provisions of the Real Property Tax Law, the real property owned by one or more persons, each of whom is 65 years of age or over, or real property owned by a husband and wife, one of whom is 65 years of age or over, shall be exempt from taxation up to a maximum of 50% of the assessed valuation thereof, as hereinafter provided.

§ 220-30 Schedule of exemptions.

A. All the provisions, conditions and requirements of § 467 of the Real Property Tax Law and amendments thereto shall apply to the application for and the granting of such exemption on the assessment rolls of the towns as they apply to the County of Putnam except that no exemption shall be granted if the income of the owner or the combined income of the owners of the property for the income tax year immediately preceding the date of making application for exemption is: for the year 2023, the sum of \$48,400 or

more; for the year 2024, the sum of \$53,400 or more; for the year 2025, the sum of \$58,400 or more.

B. Real property owned by persons 65 years of age or over shall be exempt from certain County taxes up to a maximum of 50%.

§ 220-31 Qualified period of ownership.

"Income tax year" shall mean the twelve-month period from which the owner or owners file a federal personal income tax return or, if no such return is filed, in the calendar year. When title is vested in either the husband or wife, the combined income of both may not exceed such sum.

§ 220-32 Applicability.

This article shall apply to the assessment roll as follows: for § 220-30B(1) commencing for the year 2023 and for the taxable year 2023/2024; for § 220-30B(2) commencing for the

year 2024 and for the taxable year 2024/2025; and for § 220-30B(3) commencing for the year 2025 and for the taxable year 2025/2026.

§ 220-33 Penalties for offenses.

Any person or persons who willfully make a false statement in the application of this exemption shall be punishable by a fine of not more than \$100 and shall disqualify the applicant or applicants from further exemption for a period of five years.

§ 220-34 When effective.

This article shall take effect immediately.

Section 2.

This local law shall take effect immediately upon its filing with the NYS Secretary of State.

Section 1.

§ 220-56 Statutory authority; exemption granted.

Pursuant to the provisions of § 459-c of the Real Property Tax Law (RPTL), real property owned by one or more persons with disabilities, as defined by RPTL § 459-c, Subdivision 2(b), or real property owned by a husband, wife or both or by siblings, at least one of whom has such a disability, and whose income, as defined herein, is limited by reason of such disability, shall be exempt from County real property taxation to the extent of 50% of the assessed valuation thereof as hereinafter provided.

§ 220-57 Maximum income.

All terms, conditions and requirements of RPTL, § 459-c, shall apply to the application for and the granting of such exemption on the assessment rolls of the towns as they apply to the County of Putnam, except that no exemption shall be granted if the combined

income of the owner or owners of the property for the income tax year immediately preceding the date of making application for exemption is: for the year 2023, the sum of \$48,400 or more; for the year 2024, the sum of \$53,400 or more; and for the year 2025, the sum of \$58,400 or more.

§ 220-58 Exemption schedule.

§ 220-59 Eligibility.

In order to qualify for an exemption pursuant to this article, the combined income of the owner or owners of the property for income tax year immediately preceding the date of the application for exemption from all sources, as set forth in § 459-c(5)(a) of Real Property Tax Law must be less than \$48,400 for the year 2023; \$53,400 for the year 2024; and \$58,400 for the year 2025. "Income tax year" shall mean the twelve-month period from which the owner or owners file a federal personal income tax return, or if no such return is filed, in the calendar year. When title is vested in either the husband or wife, or ex-husband or ex-wife is absent from the property due to divorce, legal separation or abandonment, then only the income of both may not exceed such sum, except where the husband or wife, or ex-husband or ex-wife is absent from the property due to divorce, legal separation or abandonment, then only the income of the spouse or ex-spouse residing on the property shall be considered and may not exceed such sum.

§ 220-60 Proof of disability.

In conjunction with the provisions of RPTL § 459-c, Subdivision 2(b) an award letter from the Social Security Administration evidencing receipt of Social Security Disability Insurance (SSDI) or supplemental security income (SSI) benefits; or the Railroad Retirement Board evidencing receipt of railroad retirement disability benefits; or a certificate from the State Commission for the Blind and Visually Handicapped stating that such person is legally blind shall be submitted as proof of disability.

§ 220-61 Application for exemption.

Application for an exemption pursuant to this article must be made annually by the owner or all the owners of the property, on forms prescribed by the State Board, and shall be filed in the Assessor's office on or before the applicable taxable status date; provided, however, that proof of permanent disability need be submitted only in the year exemption is first sought or the disability is first determined to be permanent.

§ 220-62 Applicability.

This article shall apply to the assessment roll for § 220-58A commencing for the year 2023 and for the taxable year 2023/2024; for § 220-58B commencing for the year 2024 and

for the taxable year 2024/2025; for § 220-58C commencing for the year 2025 and for the taxable year 2025/2026, and the provisions of § 459-c of the Real Property Tax Law shall govern the granting of such exception notwithstanding any contrary provisions of such section.

WHEREAS, Plaintiff sought recovery for compensatory damages in the amount of \$354,436.62, as well as the cost of storage of the materials for almost 6 full years at a contractual rate of \$1,083.70 per day which totals over two million (\$2,000,000) dollars; and

WHEREAS, on or about June 21, 2021 the County of Putnam filed a Third-Party Complaint in the action against the surety for Burtis, Allied World Specialty Insurance ("Allied"), C&S Engineers, Inc. ("C&S") and Hudson Valley Engineering Associates, P.C. ("HVEA"); and

WHEREAS, Allied, C&S and HVEA all served Verified Answers with Cross-Claims against all co-Defendants seeking contribution and indemnification for the damages alleged by CBW; and

WHEREAS, mediation was agreed to by all parties and took place on April 28, 2022, and was continued and completed on June 29, 2022, wherein the following amounts were agreed to be paid to CBW by each respective party to the litigation, subject to the approval of the Legislature:

Eric Gross, Resident of Carmel and Reporter for the Putnam County Courier and Putnam County News & Recorder, congratulated the Commissioners of the Board of Elections on their appointments: Cathy Croft and Kelly Primavera. He provided some insight to the past 50 plus years and how Putnam County has called into the New York State Elections Services the results of the elections. Legislator Sayegh stated she too recognized Legislators Albano and Sullivan and congratulated them on this, their last Full Meeting. She stated she wished them success and stated their institutional knowledge will be missed. She recognized that Hanukkah would begin on December 18, 2022. She stated there has been a lot of antisemitism in our Country. She stated she stands with her Jewish friends and family and she was against antisemitism. She wished everyone a happy Hannukah and Merry Christmas.

The meeting was called to order at 7:01 P.M. by County Clerk Michael Bartolotti who requested Legislator Gouldman to lead in the Pledge of Allegiance. County Clerk Bartolotti then requested Legislator Sayegh to lead in the Legislative Prayer. Upon roll call, Legislators Montgomery, Gouldman, Addonizio, Nacerino, Jonke, Castellano, Sayegh and Crowley were present. Legislator Ellner was absent. Also present was Legislative Counsel Firriolo.

Item #4 – Appointment/Chair/Putnam County Legislature was called first. County Clerk Bartolotti requested nominations from the floor for Chair of the Legislature.

Legislator Castellano made a motion to nominate Legislator Jonke as Chairman; seconded by Legislator Nacerino.

He stated that some people agree with what they publish and some do not, but the reality is that there is free press. He believed that it was important to have a local physical newspaper.

Legislator Sayegh stated that she also believed in free press but did not think that was the issue. She stated that for her we would be saving taxpayers' money and we are only required to approve one (1) official newspaper. She believed the Administration would be providing some of this information on the County's website which is available to everyone.

Legislator Addonizio concurred with Legislator Gouldman. She stated that we cannot control what is printed in the papers and the Courier has been around for 100 years. She stated that she would be voting in favor of keeping this an official newspaper of the County.

Legislator Montgomery concurred with Legislator Gouldman and free press, however, she did not see how we have a free press when we have the appearance of a quid pro quo.

Legislator Gouldman stated that to be fair to the entire County, we have a western and eastern part of the County. He stated that even though the Putnam County Courier and the Putnam County News & Recorder are owned by the same company and managed by the same individuals, they publish different articles based on the locations within the part of the County they cover. He believed that both newspapers should be kept as official newspapers of the County.

Chairman Jonke requested that Legislative Counsel Firriolo explain why we cannot at this time.

Legislative Counsel Firriolo stated that it was his understanding that the Legislature has not received any confirmation from the Administration or the Sheriff's Department that an option to exercise the contract to extend it for one (1) year with PrimeCare has been executed. There is correspondence indicating that both sides are in favor of it, but as of today, he and the Legislative Clerk were trying to get confirmation that the option was actually exercised, and they were unable to obtain that. He stated that another piece of information that we would be required to vote on would be a recommendation from either PrimeCare or the Sheriff's Department that they would like the Legislature to designate an individual as the Chief Medical Officer. He stated that the Legislature has not received that either request. He believed it would be impossible for the Legislature to vote on this issue in the absence of that information.

Legislator Gouldman questioned if the resolution would be brought back up when the information is received.

Legislative Counsel Firriolo said yes. He stated that the benefit of removing it from the agenda instead of moving to table this is that once it is removed from the agenda it could be placed on the agenda at the next opportunity, whether it's a Special or Full meeting agenda. If it was tabled and referred to a Committee it could take longer.

By Poll Vote: All Ayes. Legislator Ellner was absent. Motion carries.

DESIGNATION OFJAIL CHIEF MEDICAL OFFICER

WHEREAS, due to a change in the Corrections Law, Section 501 in July of 2017, a physician from the medical services provider to the Putnam County Jail shall be designated by the Putnam County Legislature to act as the Chief Medical Officer of the Jail; and

WHEREAS, PrimeCare was awarded the RFP to provide medical services for the Putnam County Corrections Facility initially through December 31, 2021; and

WHEREAS, as stated in Resolution #26 of 2022, Putnam County exercised the contractual option to extend Prime Care's contract under the terms of the RFP response through December 31, 2022; and

WHEREAS, Putnam County has exercised the contractual option to extend Prime Care's contract under the terms of the RFP response through December 31, 2023; and

WHEREAS, PrimeCare has proposed Dr. Michael Nesheiwat to continue to act as the Chief Medical Officer for the Jail; now therefore be it

RESOLVED, that the Putnam County Legislature hereby designates Dr. Michael Nesheiwat to act as the Chief Medical Officer for the Putnam County Corrections Facility, for a period of one (1) year, said term to expire December 31, 2023.

Item #30 - Authorization for Intermunicipal Agreement with Certain Putnam County Municipalities to Effectuate a Mutual Aid and Rapid Response Plan for the Police Departments of Participating Municipalities (approved at December Protective Committee Meeting) was next. Chairman Jonke made a motion to moved the following; seconded by Legislators Addonizio and Nacerino.

Legislator Montgomery stated that she raised some issues during the Committee meeting. She was surprised that it still moved out of Committee because this had not been shared with the executive officers of the municipalities involved. She stated that because it is scanned confidential, she can not share it with the representatives in her district. She did not see a reason for the document to be marked confidential. She believed this would impact the municipalities. She explained that usually there is no cost involved in a mutual aid agreement. She explained the situation in the Town of Philipstown with a Countywide Mutual Aid Plan for Emergency Response and Ambulance Care. She stated that the Town of Philipstown has paid EMTs and because of the Mutual Aid Plan are covering calls from Putnam Valley and the Town of Kent. She stated that at the Town of Philipstown taxpayer's expense we are left without EMTs in our town because they are responding to calls from other areas. She believed that sometimes these Mutual Aid Plans do not always work the way they should. She explained that the

Sheriff said during the Committee meeting that there was no cost involved. She stated that the plan mentions that the municipality receiving police aid shall reimburse the municipality providing such aid for any money paid by it by police salaries and other expenses incurred by it including damage to or loss of equipment and supplies. She believed it was saying that we do have to reimburse that municipality. She stated that she would like to see a response from the Supervisors and Mayors of the towns and villages regarding what their attorneys were thinking about this. She explained that the Plan itself appears to be in draft form and not ready for adoption. She explained how the table of contents does not correspond with the body of the document. She believed the Mutual Aid Plan was a good idea but it was not ready for adoption. She questioned the costs related to it and will an umbrella insurance policy be needed.

Legislator Montgomery made a motion to table this item.

Chairman Jonke stated that there being no second; motion fails.

Legislator Gouldman questioned Legislative Counsel Firriolo if this is approved tonight, was a living document that could be changed moving forward.

Legislative Counsel Firriolo stated that he could not answer that question. He would need to defer to the Law Department. He stated that they were the ones negotiating this with the towns. He stated that because the other municipalities have not yet executed it, there is always room for amendments. It might need to come back to the Legislature in its amended form, but if the Legislature approves it tonight it certainly is not an executed document.

Chairman Jonke read the seventh Whereas Clause which explains the Plan is to be revised as necessary. It also explained who would implement those revisions.

Legislator Nacerino believed it was important to approve the essence of the document of the Mutual Aid Plan in Putnam County. She believed that the municipality has the law enforcement agency to communicate to the town board. She believed that the town board deserves the right to perform their due diligence and confer with their lawyers, insurance companies and whoever else they need to before they make their decision.

Legislator Addonizio stated that she spoke with Town of Kent Supervisor Jamie McGlasson and Town of Kent Police Chief Kevin Owens who believed it was a good idea to have this Plan in place. She believed in the collaboration and Mutual Aid Response Plan and its commonsense approach. She believed that each department had their own tactical gear that is shared when responding which was the essence of this Plan.

Legislator Sayegh stated that she was surprised that a Plan had not already been implemented. She believed that law enforcement should be working collaboratively. She was concerned about overtime and inquired during the Committee meeting. She stated that each department is responsible for their own assets. She stated that it was her understanding that this is an agreement with respective police departments which can be revised.

Legislator Castellano stated that Sheriff McConville mentioned that he had spoke with the police departments involved. He stated that certainly the option will be on the local municipalities to opt out. He stated that the three (3) big police departments are; the Sheriff's Department, Town of Carmel and Town of Kent. He believed that we needed this Plan in place. He believed that there was no requirement to participate and it has not been executed as of yet. He hoped that the local police departments can work together to implement something that is needed in the case of emergency.

Legislator Montgomery wanted to clarify something Legislative Counsel Firriolo stated. She stated that the Law Department is not speaking with the towns yet. She did not understand what everyone was reading when they say that there is no cost involved. She stated that on many different pages of the document it states that the municipality needing police aid shall reimburse the municipality providing such aid. She did not understand why we would put something on the towns which we represent without having their input. She stated that she would not be voting in favor of this.

Chairman Jonke stated that this is something that can be revised as necessary. It is about public safety, and he will be voting in favor of it.

Legislator Sayegh explained that she too was concerned about the reimbursement by the municipality provided such aid for any money paid by it for police salaries and other expenses including damage to, or loss of, equipment and supplies. She stated that it was clarified to her during the Committee meeting that it applied only for damage to or lost equipment supplies. She concurred with Legislator Montgomery that it is a Mutual Aid Agreement and why would wording include police salaries.

Chairman Jonke called for a Roll Call Vote:

AUTHORIZATION FOR INTERMUNICIPAL AGREEMENT WITH CERTAIN PUTNAM COUNTY MUNICIPALITIES TO EFFECTUATE A MUTUAL AID AND RAPID RESPONSE PLAN FOR THE POLICE DEPARTMENTS OF PARTICIPATING MUNICIPALITIES

WHEREAS, the Putnam County Sheriff's Office has created a Mutual Aid and Rapid Response Plan (hereinafter the "Plan") to formalize operational procedures for law enforcement assistance to participating agencies; and

WHEREAS, the Plan provides that each member law enforcement agency agrees to make available its police personnel and equipment to the others upon the occurrence of a condition which is beyond the scope of its police resources; and

WHEREAS, the County of Putnam desires to enter into this agreement with neighboring municipalities in and outside of Putnam County; and

WHEREAS, entry into such intermunicipal agreement is permitted under Article 5-G of the General Municipal Law; and

WHEREAS, due to prevailing world, national, and local security situations, the everincreasing flow of intelligence, and actual threats directed against once benign sites and facilities, the parties desire that the Plan be flexible and subject to review and revision as necessary in a timely manner; and

WHEREAS, the Plan is governed by, and liabilities and costs are apportioned pursuant to, the provision of New York State General Municipal Law Section 209-m, which provides, inter alia, that absent agreement to the contrary, the municipality receiving police aid shall reimburse the municipality providing such aid for any money paid by it for police salaries and other expenses incurred by it including damage to, or loss of, equipment and supplies; and

WHEREAS, the Plan is to be revised as necessary and revisions to the Plan will be approved and implemented by the Putnam County Chief Law Enforcement Officers, namely, the Putnam County Sheriff and the Police Chiefs of the Town of Carmel, Town of Kent, the Village of Brewster and the Village of Coldspring, and such revisions may include, but are not limited to, updates in protocols and additions of new municipalities and their police departments located within or outside of the physical boundaries of Putnam County to participate in the Plan; now therefore be it

RESOLVED, that the County of Putnam be and hereby is authorized to enter into an inter-municipal agreement ("IMA") with certain municipal corporations as defined in Article 5-G of the New York State General Municipal law, located both within and outside of the County of Putnam (collectively the "Participating Municipalities"), in order to effectuate a Mutual Aid and Rapid Response Plan for the police departments of the Participating Municipalities (the "Plan") to carry out the purpose described in Section 209-m of the New York State General Municipal Law; and be it further

RESOLVED, that such IMA and the Plan shall be substantially similar in form and content to the draft items accompanying this Resolution; and be it further

RESOLVED, the term of the IMA will conform with the existing term agreed upon by the municipalities, which is five (5) years commencing in January, 2023, and continuing through January, 2028; and be it further

RESOLVED, that the County Executive is authorized to execute said IMA on behalf of the County of Putnam; and be it further

RESOLVED, that this Resolution shall take effect immediately.

BY ROLL CALL VOTE: FIVE AYES. TWO NAYS – LEGISLATORS MONTGOMERY & SAYEGH. ONE ABSENTION – LEGISLATOR CROWLEY. LEGISLATOR ELLNER WAS ABSENT. MOTION CARRIES.

Chairman Jonke made a motion to remove Item #31 and Item #32 from the agenda; seconded by Legislator Nacerino.

Legislative Counsel Firriolo clarified that the motion to remove is not debatable.

Chairman Jonke called for a Roll Call Vote.

By Roll Call Vote: Six Ayes – Legislators Addonizio, Castellano, Gouldman, Nacerino, Sayegh and Chairman Jonke. One Nay – Legislator Montgomery. One Abstention – Legislator Crowley. Legislator Ellner was absent. Motion carries.

Item #31 - Ratification of Memorandum of Agreement (MOA)/ Putnam County Sheriff's Department Police Benevolent Association (PBA) was next.

Item #32 - Approval/ Fund Transfer (23T001)/ Sheriff's Department/ Memorandum of Agreement (MOA)/ Police Benevolent Association, Inc. (PBA) was next.

Item #33 - Other Business

There was no other business submitted to the meeting.

Item #34 - Recognition of the Public on Agenda Items.

There was no member of the public that wished to speak.

Item #35 - Recognition of Legislators

Legislator Gouldman congratulated Legislators Jonke and Sayegh for their positions as Chair and Deputy Chair of the Legislature. He also congratulated the two (2) new Legislators. He explained that all these new positions will change the makeup of this Legislative body. He was hopeful that there would be positive changes moving forward.

Legislator Nacerino echoed Legislator Gouldman's remarks regarding the new Chair, Deputy Chair and two (2) newly elected Legislators. She stated that she looked forward to a productive year.

Legislator Montgomery welcomed Legislators Crowley and Ellner. She congratulated Legislator Crowley for how much work she did during Covid. She congratulated Legislators Jonke and Sayegh and looked forward to the coming year.

Legislator Addonizio concurred with her colleagues. She congratulated Legislators Jonke and Sayegh as Chair and Deputy Chair of the Legislature and the newly elected Legislators Crowley and Ellner. She stated that she was looking forward to a successful 2023 year.

Legislator Sayegh thanked her colleagues for putting their faith in her to serve as Deputy Chair of the Legislature. She stated that she is humbled for this responsibility and will do her best to serve on the Legislature with a humble heart. She congratulated the newly elected public officials and the newly appointed Chair of the Legislature Paul Jonke. She stated that she has faith in his judgement. She welcomed Legislators Crowley, Ellner and newly elected County Executive Kevin Byrne. She was confident that the County was in good hands moving forward. She stated that she attended a few of the Swearing-In Ceremonies. She stated that at the Swearing-In Ceremony for County Executive Byrne, former Dutchess County Executive and incoming U.S. Congressman Marc Molinaro made remarks that being in public office, it is not about making a point but rather making a difference. She stated that making a point is easy, but making a difference is difficult and it takes time. She stated that we live in a society that thrives on making a point on social media which can cause division and arguments. She stated that when we are making a point, we aren't listening. We are only trying to win an argument to seem more intelligent or to put others down. She stated that it does nothing to make a difference to achieve a better solution. She stated that her goal for 2023 is for government to be difference oriented, working together with a common goal to benefit the people who choose to live in Putnam County. She stated that it is alright not to agree on everything, but asked that we be solution oriented. She looked forward to working respectfully and collaboratively with her colleagues on the Legislature, as well as with County Executive Byrne to make a difference for Putnam County.

Legislator Castellano congratulated Legislators Sayegh, Jonke, Crowley and Ellner. He was looking forward to a great year. He explained that he is a football fan and mentioned the story from last night regarding the gentleman from the Buffalo Bills who was injured. He remarked about what a wonderful country this is that he was able to receive immediate attention and was sent to the hospital after a cardiac arrest. He hoped that he makes a speedy recovery. He also mentioned that this gentleman started a go-fund-me page with an initial goal of \$2,500 for a local charity in a small town in Pennsylvania. He

stated that it took his breathe away this afternoon when it was already over \$4 million this afternoon. He stated that this is a fantastic country that we live in and he was proud to be part of it and part of this Legislature.

There being no further business, at 7:53 P.M., Chairman Jonke made a motion to adjourn; seconded by Legislators Sayegh and Nacerino. All in favor.



WHEREAS, pursuant to Putnam County Charter § 14.01, which requires the County Legislature to order periodic evaluation of the population distribution of the County on the basis of regular federal censuses, by Resolution # 164 of 2022 the Legislature appointed a bipartisan Reapportionment Commission (the "Commission") to carry out the evaluation of existing County districts; and

WHEREAS, the Commission has presented two proposals to the Legislature, labeled "Proposal Number 1" and "Proposal Number 2," either of which would reapportion the current Legislative Districts in a manner that complies with the requirements of New York State Law and the Putnam County Charter; and

WHEREAS, the Rules, Enactments and Intergovernmental Relations Committee has considered both of the proposals and recommended to the Legislature the proposed adoption of Proposal(s) Number(s) 2; now therefore be it

RESOLVED, that in accordance with Municipal Home Rule Law § 10(1)(a)(13), the Putnam County Legislature proposes to adopt a local law implementing Proposal Number 2; and be it further

RESOLVED, that in compliance with Municipal Home Rule Law § 10(1)(a)(13)(d), the Putnam County Legislature shall hold a public hearing before adoption of such local law.

This Resolution has no fiscal impact upon the County of Putnam.

RESOLUTION #25

APPROVAL/ REQUEST TO THE BOARD OF ELECTIONS/ TRANSFER PORTIONS OF ELECTION DISTRICTS

WHEREAS, the Putnam County Reapportionment Commission has presented two proposals to the Legislature, labeled "Proposal Number 1" and "Proposal Number 2," either of which would reapportion the current Legislative Districts in a manner that complies with the requirements of New York State Law and the Putnam County Charter; and

WHEREAS, in order to effectuate the rebalancing of the populations of certain Legislative Districts to comply with New York State Law, the movement of certain 2020 Census Blocks between existing Election Districts will be required under both proposals; and

WHEREAS, for each proposal, the resulting population changes to certain Election Districts, as well as the changes to certain Election District numbers and boundaries, are reflected in the attachments hereto; and

WHEREAS, under both proposals, the proposed adjustments to certain Election Districts reflect a community of interest considering geographical barriers, historical development, and political subdivisions; and

WHEREAS, the Rules, Enactments and Intergovernmental Relations Committee has considered and approves of these adjustments; and

WHEREAS, the Putnam County Legislature has proposed to adopt a local law implementing Proposal Number 2; now therefore be it

RESOLVED, that the Putnam County Legislature requests that the Putnam County Board of Elections make the adjustments to the Election Districts as contained in Proposal Number 2.

BY POLL VOTE: ALL AYES. LEGISLATORS GOULDMAN & SAYEGH WERE ABSENT. MOTION CARRIES.

Item #5 – Proposed Adoption of Local Law Providing a Property Tax Exemption to Volunteer Firefighters and Volunteer Ambulance Workers was next. On behalf of the members of the Rules, Enactments & Intergovernmental Relations Committee, Legislators Addonizio, Ellner and Gouldman, Chairman Jonke moved the following:

Legislator Castellano stated that this is something the community desperately needs to show support for our volunteer fire fighters and volunteer ambulance workers. He stated that over the years there are less and less volunteers. He hoped this would keep volunteerism shining in Putnam County. He stated that we are thankful for these individuals who selflessly provide help to the people of Putnam County in their time of need.

Chairman Jonke explained that having been in the property tax business for years, there were always arguments about exemptions. He stated that this particular exemption benefits people who serve our community and it is funded by the community. He explained that without these volunteers, if we ever had to have a paid fire or ambulance department, the cost to the community would be much greater than these exemptions which is a token of our appreciation. He stated that he was happy to move this forward.

Legislator Addonizio concurred. She stated that she was happy to see this move forward. She stated that our volunteers are the backbone of Putnam County. She believed that we not only do everything we can to ensure that they stay, but also to encourage new members.

Legislator Montgomery encouraged any other taxing entity to tax this gift we have been handed by the State by passing the same legislation.

RESOLUTION #26

APPROVAL/ PROPOSED ADOPTION OF LOCAL LAW PROVIDING A PROPERTY TAX EXEMPTION TO VOLUNTEER FIREFIGHTERS AND VOLUNTEER AMBULANCE WORKERS

WHEREAS, on December 9, 2022, the State of New York enacted Real Property Tax Law (RPTL) § 466-a, which empowers all local governments with the option to provide a property tax exemption to volunteer firefighters and volunteer ambulance workers; and

WHEREAS, the current Putnam County Code, in Chapter 220, Article 10, implemented RPTL § 466-c to provide a real property tax exemption of 10 percent for qualified members of volunteer fire departments and ambulance corps in Putnam County; and

WHEREAS, RPTL § 466-a will repeal RPTL § 466-c on December 9, 2025; and WHEREAS, RPTL § 466-a confers additional benefits upon volunteer firefighters and volunteer ambulance workers than were available under RPTL § 466-c, including the

removal of a fixed cap on the amount of the exemption and applicability to qualified unremarried spouses of volunteer firefighters or volunteer ambulance workers killed in the line of duty; and

WHEREAS, the Putnam County Legislature and the Putnam County Executive desire to enact this expanded exemption to assist the County's volunteer fire and ambulance services in maintaining the ranks of the volunteer corps and encourage volunteers to join; and

WHEREAS, the enabling legislation enacted by the State Legislature requires that localities must adopt a local law in order to afford those volunteers such exemption, and that the Legislature hold a public hearing prior to its adoption; now therefore be it

RESOLVED, that the Putnam County Legislature proposes to adopt a local law implementing RPTL § 466-a and repealing RPTL § 466-c; and be it further

RESOLVED, that in compliance with RPTL § 466-a, the Putnam County Legislature shall hold a public hearing before adoption of such local law.

BY POLL VOTE: ALL AYES. LEGISLATORS GOULDMAN & SAYEGH WERE ABSENT. MOTION CARRIES.

APPROVAL/ LOCAL LAW AMENDING CHAPTER 220 OF THE CODE OF PUTNAM COUNTY ENTITLED "TAXATION" (Members of Volunteer Fire Depts & Ambulance Corps Exemption)

Be it enacted by the Legislature of the County of Putnam as follows:

Section 1.

Article X of Chapter 220 of the Putnam County Code as added by L.L. No. 1 of 2003 is hereby repealed and replaced as follows:

ARTICLE X

Exemption for Qualified Members of Volunteer Fire Departments and Ambulance Corps

§ 220-65 Legislative intent.

Chapter 670 of the Laws of 2022 added a new section 466-a to the Real Property Tax Law, repealing prior sections 466-a through 466-k, though continuing the exemption provided therein. New section 466-a provides a real property tax exemption of 10% for qualified members of volunteer fire departments and ambulance corps statewide, subject to adoption by individual municipalities. Members of volunteer fire departments and ambulance corps provide valuable services to the people of Putnam County. In order to be certified and recertified, such volunteers must undertake numerous hours of training on their own time and frequently at their own expense. The purpose of this exemption is to maintain the ranks of the volunteer corps and encourage volunteers to join. The enabling legislation enacted by the State Legislature requires that localities must adopt a local law in order to afford those volunteers such exemption.

§ 220-66 Requirements.

Such exemption shall not be granted to an enrolled member of an incorporated volunteer fire company, fire department, or incorporated voluntary ambulance service residing in such county unless:

- A. The applicant resides in the city, town, or village which is served by such incorporated volunteer fire company, fire department, or incorporated voluntary ambulance service;
- B. The property is the primary residence of the applicant;
- C. The property is used exclusively for residential purposes; provided however, that in the event any portion of such property is not used exclusively for the applicant's residence but is used for other purposes, such portion shall be subject to taxation and the remaining portion only shall be entitled to the exemption provided by this section; and
- D. The applicant has been certified by the authority having jurisdiction for the incorporated volunteer fire company, fire department, or voluntary ambulance service as an enrolled member of such incorporated volunteer fire company, fire department, or voluntary ambulance service for a period of five years of service.
- E. The applicant must file a certificate from his or her qualifying organization that he or she is an enrolled member. Such certification of membership must certify that the member received credit under a service award program defined by Article 11-A, 11-AA, 11-AAA, or 11-AAAA of the General Municipal Law for the period of service claimed in the application.

§ 220-67 Lifetime exemption.

Any enrolled member of an incorporated volunteer fire company, fire department, or incorporated voluntary ambulance service who accrues more than twenty years of active service and is so certified by the authority having jurisdiction for the incorporated volunteer fire company, fire department, or incorporated voluntary ambulance service, shall be granted the ten percent exemption as authorized by this section for the remainder of his or her life as long as his or her primary residence is located within such county.

§ 220-68 Spousal exemption where member is killed in the line of duty.

Un-remarried spouses of volunteer firefighters or volunteer ambulance workers killed in the line of duty. An exemption granted under this chapter shall be continued, and a pre-existing exemption shall be reinstated, where the exemption was previously claimed by an enrolled member of an incorporated volunteer fire company, fire department, or incorporated voluntary ambulance service, to such deceased enrolled member's un-remarried spouse if such member is killed in the line of duty; provided, however, that:

A. Such un-remarried spouse is certified by the authority having jurisdiction for the incorporated volunteer fire company, fire department, or incorporated voluntary ambulance service as an un-remarried spouse of an

enrolled member of such incorporated volunteer fire company, fire department, or incorporated voluntary ambulance service who was killed in the line of duty; and

- B. Such deceased volunteer had been an enrolled member for at least five years; and
- C. Such deceased volunteer had been receiving the exemption prior to his or her death.

§ 220-69 Spousal exemption where member is deceased.

Un-remarried spouses of deceased volunteer firefighters or volunteer ambulance workers. An exemption granted under this chapter shall be continued, and a pre-existing exemption shall be reinstated, to an un-remarried spouse of a deceased enrolled member of an incorporated volunteer fire company, fire department, or incorporated voluntary ambulance service; provided, however, that:

- A. Such un-remarried spouse is certified by the authority having jurisdiction for the incorporated volunteer fire company, fire department, or incorporated voluntary ambulance service as an un-remarried spouse of a deceased enrolled member of such incorporated volunteer fire company, fire department, or incorporated voluntary ambulance service; and
- B. Such deceased volunteer had been an enrolled member for at least twenty years; and
- C. Such deceased volunteer and un-remarried spouse had been receiving the exemption for such property prior to the death of such volunteer.

§ 220-70 Application for exemption.

- A. Application for such exemption, along with the certificate of membership defined above, shall be filed with the applicable town assessor on or before the taxable status date on a form as prescribed by the Commissioner of the Office of Real Property Tax Services.
- B. Certification shall be required for any period of time claimed by an applicant that is not already on file with the applicable town assessor.
- C. The assessor shall review the application and certification to ensure they have satisfied the requirements of this law.

§ 220-71 Continuation of exemption.

No applicant who is a volunteer firefighter or volunteer ambulance worker who by reason of such status is receiving any benefit under the provisions of this article on the effective date of this section shall suffer any diminution of such benefit because of the provisions of this section. Any exemption under Article X of Chapter 220 as added by L.L. No. 1 of 2003 shall be considered the same and equivalent to the exemption available under this article.

Section 3.

This Local Law shall take effect immediately upon the filing with the secretary of state.



Attached please find the above referenced budgetary transfer to reallocate existing 2023 county funding to reflect our need for streamlining the structure and staffing of the County Executive's Office. Additionally, this proposed transfer will address other needs that will enhance our county government's operations and compensate managers and department heads who are taking on added responsibilities on a temporary basis. Please note that all changes work within the previous administration's 2023 budget framework as passed by the Legislature. The transfer does not affect the tax levy or pull from the general fund. In fact, the total budget transfer proposal results in a **net savings of over \$64,000** to the county budget.

I respectfully request your support in passing this package to better enable our county government to support our managers who are temporarily filling other management roles; enhance our capabilities to serve constituents in both the Legislative and Executive branches; and professionalize our county government with the addition of a Communications Director and Director of Compliance and Intergovernmental Relations. These two director positions will be based in the County Executive's office and are highly needed positions that will support and interface with all other county departments, ensure compliance with federal, state, and local laws, and provide timely information to the public. These proposed changes will permit us to continue to deliver core government services while also developing more creative, transparent, and efficient solutions that will enhance both communications and constituent engagement.

STIPENDS

This request includes funding for three temporary stipends to compensate individuals who are filling additional roles including the Acting Administrator of Highway and Facilities, the Acting Deputy Administrator of Highway and Facilities, and the Acting Administrator of the Department of Planning, Development and Public Transportation. Each of these stipends equal to a 10% increase to the

individual's original base salary. The additional responsibilities and work they are taking on will also provide the county with a substantive temporary savings from vacant management lines, not reflected in this proposal

Please note that we are currently recruiting for the Commissioner of Highway and Facilities and for the Commissioner of Planning, Development and Public Transportation. Both positions are currently posted online. We will be performing an extensive search and conducting due diligence in evaluating candidates for these two critical departments which will take some time.

STAFF ADJUSTMENTS

An adjustment is included for the Deputy County Executive line which will result in a net savings overall for this position. The salary adjustment will place the pay rate at a level comparable to the Deputy's prior rate of pay as Office of General Services Commissioner with Orange County, his previous employer. The Deputy's health insurance line will be decreased by \$28,000 as this individual has waived his health insurance coverage with Putnam County. As noted, this results in a significant net savings from the previously budgeted amount for the position.

The creation of two new positions (Communications Director and Director of Compliance and Intergovernmental Relations), as referenced earlier, are to enhance our county government services, ensure compliance, provide transparent communications, and greater professionalize our county government. The position of Communications Director will be a lateral move from the existing Director of Constituent Services, a position which will be eliminated. In addition, this individual has declined family health coverage resulting in \$27,583 in savings to the County. Detailed job specifications for these two positions are enclosed with this proposal.

CONSTITUENT SERVICES

The new \$40,000 budget line is for licensing software to seek out a new opportunity to purchase a professional Constituent Relationship Management (CRM) system that can support both the County Executive's Office and the County Legislature in managing, tracking, communicating, and responding to constituent services and requests.

COST SAVINGS

In addition to the various savings mentioned above to fund these changes, additional cost-cutting measures that will support this restructure include:

- 1. The elimination of the Director of Constituent Services position in the County Executive's Office. The Chief of Staff will continue to manage constituent services, supported by the office's Confidential Secretary. This is in addition to active oversight of constituent casework by both the County Executive and Deputy County Executive.
- 2. The elimination of licensing software previously budgeted at \$50,0000 for the Purchasing Department. This software is no longer attainable at the budgeted price as numerous nearby counties have ended their agreement with the

- provider. It is also redundant as the County can continue to use the BidNet service from the state at no additional cost.
- 3. The elimination of the newly created, unfilled "Purchaser" position in the Purchasing Department. Given the size of the County, this position was deemed unnecessary. Added support by both the Deputy County Executive and Director of Compliance and Intergovernmental Relations, specifically as it pertains to reviewing and monitoring contracts and ARPA projects, are expected to supplement the department.
- 4. A decrease in \$68,825 from two subcontingency accounts in the County Executive's office and in the Department of Highway & Facilities.


We request the staff titles, annual salaries, and stipends be retroactive to January 1, 2023.

DIRECTOR OF COMMUNICATIONS

DISTINGUISHING FEATURES OF THE CLASS: The Director of Communications acts as a member of the County Executive's team and is responsible for developing and managing the delivery of a comprehensive engagement strategy and communication plan for community outreach, public relations, public information, and media relations that amplify the County's priorities and drives engagement across internal and external communities; while clearly defining objectives, timelines, and measures for success. The incumbent develops and implements the branding for County departments and programs and serves as the County's liaison for media outlets; fielding questions, ensuring accurate coverage, and planning for media appearances by County officials. The Communications Director works directly with and assists the County Executive and department heads to develop and issue key information about County government, serving as a leader and advisor in all communications as needed. The Director plays a critical role in building public trust through various communications programs and initiatives and advancing transparency and accountability of Putnam County government. The Director ensures that critical public information is accessible in different languages, pursuant to policies on language access. The Director works as member of the County Executive's staff with wide leeway for independent judgment.

TYPICAL WORK ACTIVITIES: (Illustrative only)

Directs staff and contracted vendors in the coordination, development and implementation of internal and external communications, public information and community relations activities (i.e., broadcasting or streaming of meetings, website, social marketing programs, special events, etc.);

Supports County Executive and other organizational leaders in the development of communications, including speeches, presentations and print/digital communications.

Oversees the creation of background briefing documents for the County Executive before major interviews, meetings and presentations;

Advises and counsels management and staff on policies, plans, and practices that affect the County's relationship with the public;

Coordinates, plans, and manages integrated internal and external communication activities; Interacts with County Executive, elected officials and staff across multiple departments and agencies to coordinate messaging and public information for special projects and during emergency events;

Develops key messages, press releases, social media, website content, print and electronic communication;

Assists departments with the development and implementation of communication strategies and crisis communications;

Provides accessible, easily understood information about Putnam County services and programs using various communication strategies, tools, and tactics, including language translation;

Anticipates media responses, prepares spokesperson(s) and responds to media inquiries;

Administers and manages public and employee information programs;

Provides oversight and direction for digital communications, including the website, e-newsletters, digital signage, intranet, and social media;

Plans, organizes, and directs efforts that enhance Putnam County's image in the community through relationship building, special events, branding, and information sharing;

Manages the dissemination of prompt, accurate information during emergency situations;

Develops and recommends new communication methods to better achieve County goals, including fostering core values and marketing County services to residents, community groups, and other external organizations;

Coordinates public events, including open houses, ceremonies, and other public functions;

Responds to requests to produce video programming and photography;
Advises and trains County staff and officials in effective use of media;
Engages departments in community outreach and education events;
May act as lead Public Information Officer or a team member of the PIO team responsible for communication functions during emergency or crisis events;
Performs related duties as necessary

Typical Work Activities are intended only as illustrations of possible types of work that might be appropriately assigned to an incumbent of this title. Work activities that do not appear above are not excluded as appropriate work assignments, as long as they can be reasonably understood to be within the logical limits of the job.

FULL PERFORMANCE KNOWLEDGES, SKILLS, ABILITIES AND PERSONAL CHARACTERISTICS:

Thorough knowledge of the organization, functions, laws, policies, regulations, programs and goals of Putnam County government; thorough knowledge of public relations principles and practices as they pertain to internal and external communication needs of a large organization; thorough knowledge of current communications trends in a government setting, including extensive knowledge of the use of social media; thorough knowledge and ability in graphic design and software; superior oral and written communications skills; ability to create and articulate messages to a wide range of audiences; ability to manage multiple projects; ability to design and execute process where none exists; ability to interact effectively with senior leadership, elected officials, community leaders and external constituencies; ability to deliver complex messages in simple, concise and understandable ways; exceptional writing and presentation skills; excellent organizational and strong project management skills; excellent editing and proofreading skills; excellent interpersonal skills; self-starter, able to establish priorities and work independently; attention to detail that drives high quality outputs; comfortable with change and uses feedback to drive personal growth and development; consistently acts with integrity and maintains a high degree of confidentiality; high-energy and optimistic; Initiative, courtesy, integrity and tact.

MINIMUM OUALIFICATIONS:

- a) Master's Degree, or higher, and two (2) years of paid experience in a position with substantial public information responsibility; or
- b) Bachelor's Degree, and four (4) years of paid experience in a position with substantial public information responsibility; or

DIRECTOR OF COMPLIANCE AND INTERGOVERNMENTAL RELATIONS

DISTINGUISHING FEATURES OF THE CLASS: This position is responsible for conducting professional level work and maintaining communications with County departments and local government and community agencies on behalf of the County Executive to ensure functional, legal, and financial compliance with all applicable federal, state, county and local laws, regulations, and standards. These responsibilities include the oversight and review of contracts for consideration and assuring the terms of the contracts are being met while the contract is in effect. In addition, this position assists in the direction of the procurement process within County departments and monitors the use of government support funding by County departments and local agencies. This position supports the County Executive and Deputy County Executive in maintaining relationships with elected officials, external stakeholders, and key decision makers and provides skilled advice, guidance, and direction. Duties are performed in the Office of the County Executive, under the direction of the County Executive or Deputy County Executive, with wide leeway for independent judgment. Performs related work as required.

TYPICAL WORK ACTIVITIES: (Illustrative only)

Monitors and audits the use of American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) and other support funds, totaling over 24 million dollars, by county and non-county agencies in completing projects and providing services to their respective jurisdictions, to ensure compliance with federal, state, and local laws; Identifies compliance issues, and directs follow up and investigations of the same; Monitors County contracts, ensures the maintenance of contract continuity and negotiates contract extensions;

Monitors the processes of writing requests for proposals, soliciting sealed bids and bid openings; Serves as contract liaison between Putnam County and various providers including subcontractors and other county departments and agencies;

Assists in the development of written administrative policies and procedures.

Monitors compliance systems to ensure their effectiveness;

Evaluates industry trends and best practices to assess feasibility for implementation into current department processes;

Provides guidance to Commissioner of Purchasing and Central Services on behalf of the County Executive's Office in the formulation of policies and procedures and makes recommendations regarding purchasing matters;

Reviews requests for the purchase of goods and services and recommends substitutions where savings in costs or improved delivery will result;

Analyzes request for quote (RFQ), request for proposal (RFP) and RFB documents for conformance with specification and proposal, price data and other factors affecting the quality and delivery of goods and services;

Engages with local non-county governmental agencies to ensure compliance with all applicable federal, state and local regulations;

This is a follow-up to the discussion of your proposed reorganization of the Administration at the Personnel Committee meeting held on Monday, January 30, 2023.

Your memorandum dated January 12, 2023, states, under "Constituent Services," that "a new \$40,000 budget line is for licensing software to seek out a new opportunity to purchase a professional Constituent Relationship Management (CRM) system that can support both the County Executive's Office and the County Legislature in managing, tracking, communicating, and responding to constituent services and requests."

Respectfully, I request that you provide more and detailed information regarding this proposed CRM system, including the following:

- Please identify the vendor and the name of the specific software under consideration.
- What products and/or services are covered by the \$40,000 expense?
- Does the \$40,000 expense cover the cost of use by the Legislature, if not, what is the
 amount of the additional expense. If there is an additional expense, would that amount
 come from the IT/GIS Department's budget or the Legislature's budget.
- Is the \$40,000 expense for a license fee or for an outright purchase? Is there a one-time fee for the "system," or will there be recurring, periodic license fees for software? Your memorandum mentions "purchase" but the budgetary transfer mentions "licensing."
- If there is a license fee, what is the license term associated with the \$40,000 expense, and what are the projected costs associated with future renewals of the license?
- What are the capabilities of the software? How will it be utilized and who will have access to it?

- Are there any fees other than flat fees associated with the initial license and/or purchase? For example, will fees vary depending upon how many individuals are utilizing the system, or how many are authorized to use it? Are there additional fees associated with sending communications, such as text message charges, or fees based on the number of communications sent, or number of constituents in a database?
- Are communications to constituents from the system stored and potentially available to the public through a Freedom of Information Law (FOIL) request? How are such records stored and retrieved?
- Per the budgetary transfer, it appears that the \$40,000 is under the IT/GIS budget.
 Please confirm that the licensing and/or purchase will be under the IT Department's budget and not under the County Executive's budget. Also, would future license renewals and/or fees be part of the County Executive's budget or the IT/GIS budget?

In addition, your memorandum mentions a cost savings of \$50,000 for elimination of licensing software previously budgeted for the Purchasing Department. You mentioned that "this software is no longer attainable at the budgeted price as numerous nearby counties have ended their agreement with the provider."

Please identity this provider and explain what the cost is now for this licensing software, and how it compares to BidNet. Also, since it was previously determined that such software was necessary for the Purchasing Department, please explain why it, or a substitute, is no longer required and that the budgeted expense for it may now be repurposed.

Please accept this memorandum as confirmation of my research with the New York State Department of Health (NYSDOH) regarding the potential continuation of Dr. Nesheiwat in the capacity of Commissioner of Health.

As you know, Dr. Nesheiwat has served Putnam County as Commissioner of Health subject to his attainment of a Master's degree in Public Health, as is required by NYSDOH regulations. Dr. Nesheiwat originally received a two-year conditional appointment and subsequently received two, one-year extensions over the course of the last four years.

Unfortunately, due to the extraordinary circumstances in the last four years, which included a measles outbreak, followed by the COVID-19 pandemic, most of Dr. Nesheiwat's full-time effort as Commissioner of Health was consumed responding to these significant community health issues. As a result, Dr. Nesheiwat was unable to complete the required coursework for a Master's degree in Public Health.

Dr. Nesheiwat communicated these circumstances, along with his plan to retire by the end of 2023, if approved to continue as Commissioner of Heath.

Dr. Nesheiwat was subsequently advised by the NYSDOH that he could continue past December 31, 2022, if he served in a capacity of an "Interim Commissioner of Health".

This advice was conveyed by email, dated December 9, 2022, from Loretta A. Santelli, Director, Office of Public Health Practice. In Ms. Santilli's response to Dr. Nesheiwat, she further indicated that, "your timeframe and retirement plan corresponds to an appropriate use for the Interim designation". Please note, Ms. Santilli's email to Dr. Nesheiwat dated December 9, 2022, was also sent to Dr. Mary Bassett, Commissioner of the New York State Department of Health.

Additionally, I have had numerous conversations with Ms. Susan M. Cuomo-Whitney where she confirmed the information given to Dr Nesheiwat by Ms. Santilli.

APPROVAL/PUTNAM COUNTY'S REQUEST TO EXTEND THE 1% INCREASED COUNTY SALES TAX FOR AN ADDITIONAL THREE YEARS

WHEREAS, in light of the current and ongoing fiscal challenges facing Putnam County government, it is appropriate to maintain revenues by renewing the previously authorized one percent (1%) County sales tax increase; and

WHEREAS, in accordance with Chapter 113 of the Laws of 2011 and pursuant to Resolution #41 of 2011, Resolution #88 of 2013 and Resolution #38 of 2015, the Putnam County Legislature approved the introduction and passage of legislation for the continued authorization of Putnam County's sales tax to be increased from three percent (3%) to four percent (4%) for period September 1, 2007, through November 30, 2017; and

WHEREAS, in accordance with Resolution #27 of 2017, the Putnam County Legislature approved the introduction and passage of legislation for the continued authorization of Putnam County's sales tax to be increased from three percent (3%) to four percent (4%) for period December 1, 2017, through November 30, 2019, however the State of New York subsequently extended that increase through November 30, 2020; and

WHEREAS, by Resolution #68 of 2020, the Putnam County Legislature approved the introduction and passage of legislation for the continued authorization of Putnam County's sales tax to be increased from three percent (3%) to four percent (4%) for period December 1, 2020, through November 30, 2023, which authorization is about to expire and needs to be renewed; and

WHEREAS, the Putnam County Executive and Putnam County Legislature further determine that as an alternative to dramatically raising real property taxes in Putnam County, it is necessary to renew the expiring one percent (1%) County sales tax increase; now therefore be it

RESOLVED, that the Putnam County Executive and Putnam County Legislature hereby support and request the introduction and passage of legislation authorizing the renewal of the expiring one percent (1%) County sales tax increase for an additional three (3) years, that is, for the period December 1, 2023, through November 30, 2026; and be it further

RESOLVED, that the Clerk of the Putnam County Legislature is hereby directed to forward a copy of this Resolution to our State representatives in the State Legislature as well as the Governor and leadership of our State Legislature.
