Tuesday November 15, 2022

(Immediately following the Rules Committee Meeting at 6:30PM)

The meeting was called to order at 7:42 P.M. by Chairwoman Sayegh who requested that Legislator Nacerino lead in the Pledge of Allegiance. Upon roll call Legislator Addonizio, Legislator Jonke and Chairwoman Sayegh were present.

Item #3 - Approval of Minutes – August 9 and September 12, 2022, Meetings

The minutes were approved as submitted.

Item #4 - Approval/Fund Transfer 22T315/Health Department/Increases in Preschool and Early Intervention

Chairwoman Sayegh made a motion to approve Fund Transfer 22T315; Seconded by Legislator Jonke. All in favor.

Item #5 - Approval/Budgetary Amendment 22A078/Health Department/Award from National Association of City and County Health Officials/Investment in Medical Reserve Corps

Shanna Siegel, Supervising Public Health Educator, stated the goal is to have more technical support for the Medical Reserve Corps. (MRC) in the form of equipment such as laptops and training. She stated they are interested in instituting a satellite EOC (Emergency Operations Center).

Chairwoman Sayegh stated this is a great use of funding.

Legislator Montgomery noted the importance of having a satellite EOC. She questioned how this would be utilized if areas are cut off from the County Seat.

Ms. Siegel stated they have not finalized where the satellite EOC will be stored.

Chairwoman Sayegh made a motion to approve Budgetary Amendment 22A078; Seconded by Legislator Addonizio. All in favor.

Item #6 - Approval/Budgetary Amendment 22A079/Social Services/State Rental Supplement Program Funding

Chairwoman Sayegh made a motion to approve Budgetary Amendment 22A079; Seconded by Legislator Jonke. All in favor.

**Item #7 - Discussion/Update/Mental Health Update/Commissioner of Social Services
Michael Piazza**

Commissioner Piazza stated the mental healthcare providers discuss the status of the system of care at multiple meetings. He stated that he and Deputy Commissioner Sara Servadio met with the school districts to receive feedback on what their needs are. He stated there are issues throughout the state, and the issues in Putnam are universal and you will not find a county that is not impacted in a similar way. He stated access to inpatient care is limited. He stated there are waitlists for services for children and adolescents. He added that there has been a significant increase in people seeking help since the pandemic. He noted that a big reason for the lack of capacity is that many clinicians have decided they did not want to work anymore. He stated child psychiatrists have always been hard to find and that is still the case now. He stated the use of telehealth has taken off. He stated there is also a shortage of case managers as many go into private practice. He stated it is not an issue of money, it is about who is willing to work for the available salaries. He stated supported housing providers have not recovered since the pandemic started. He stated there are 58 supported housing beds in the County, but not all are filled due to lack of staffing and/or the seriousness of the symptoms cannot be handled. He stated people come to DSS when they cannot find other help. He stated when telehealth started taking off, the State started providing laptops or tablets to police agencies so that if an officer came upon an emotionally disturbed person, they could have a telehealth visit that could reduce the crisis or guide the officer. He stated the program could not be initiated due to lack of staffing. He stated on the positive side, there is sufficient capacity in substance abuse treatment. He stated there are many initiatives in place for Narcan distribution and education. He stated there are 21 unintended death fatalities this year with 2 months to go. He stated there have been 50 overdose reversals with Narcan. He stated all known strategies to reduce fatalities are being implemented. He spoke about the idea of "sober homes" which are not licensed by the State and not funded by the County. He stated for the past four (4) weeks approximately 30 providers have taken part in a work group to examine the system of care for children. He stated they came up with five (5) action plans. He stated one (1) of them that he is involved with is establishing a work group to work specifically with the schools and have regular meetings so that when a school social worker is having an issue with a student, they do not have to wait until it becomes a crisis for additional assistance. He stated the County will also set up meetings with the school superintendents at least three (3) times a year. He stated it will include the Sheriff's Department, Probation, and the Health Department. He noted that there will also be a liaison to the schools. He stated the County Executive's commitment to a Crisis Stabilization Center continues to progress and a site next to Putnam Hospital has been identified as a potential location. He stated developmental disabilities are a point of focus for improving how they are handled. He stated many times there is no safe discharge plan for these patients.

Chairwoman Sayegh noted that she believes the difficulties with handing developmentally disabled patients is universal, as she knows a nurse in another state that deals with similar issues. She questioned if there have been any solutions found for the various issues Commissioner Piazza mentioned.

Commissioner Piazza stated the State recognizes what the needs are and they are caught in similar situations. He stated it is not an answer but there is an acknowledgment of the issues.

Chairwoman Sayegh noted that our school system stresses importance of technology and not human services and interactions.

Legislator Addonizio suggested using funds from the opioid settlement for the Stabilization Center. She questioned if that could be done.

Commissioner Piazza stated it could be used and would be appropriate.

Legislator Montgomery stated she wished that County Executive Odell had given the Legislature an opportunity to be part of the decision making process with the Stabilization Center. She stated it will not help her constituents as it is the same distance to the Poughkeepsie Stabilization Center. She stated she would have rather funded existing programs, for example The Prevention Council, Mental Health Association, and CoveCare. She stated these providers have not had their funding increased in years. She stated she knows that these agencies appreciate the consistent support but it is up to the County to realize that their costs have increased. She played a voicemail message from a constituent who could not make it and had issues with getting mental health services and was told that CoveCare was not taking new patients due to lack of staffing. She stated there is no transportation for people to get to healthcare if they are not on Medicaid. She stated Westchester and Dutchess Counties have decreased taxes while still investing in mental health resources.

Chairwoman Sayegh noted some aspects that Legislator Montgomery mentioned have to do with State funding, which the County is reliant on.

Legislator Nacerino thanked Commissioner Piazza for his thorough update. She stated it was important to make it known that the struggles that Putnam County faces are not unique to the County but are universal and felt all over. She thanked all the mental health professionals in our community. She stated these are unprecedented times.

Legislator Addonizio thanked Commissioner Piazza for providing the facts. She stated it is not any different from any other county. She stated it comes down to a lack of workers.

Commissioner Piazza noted that vacancies in staffing create wait lists.

Chairwoman Sayegh noted she received a similar message to the one that Legislator Montgomery played. She stated she is happy to see that mental health professionals are becoming more involved in the schools. She stated the school psychologists have been very helpful.

Legislator Montgomery stated her frustration with the lack of funding from the County for the Philipstown Behavioral Health Hub (Hub).

Larry Burke, Commanding Officer of the Village of Cold Spring Police, stated the overdose figures are inaccurate because they do not account for the ones who do not call 911 and use an at home Narcan kit. He stated Commissioner Piazza does a great job.

Rebecca Pearsall, Philipstown Hub Board Member, stated she is excited to be here. She stated these are unprecedented times. She stated she is looking forward to working together.

Legislator Addonizio stated the Opioid Settlement money could be used to help fund the Philipstown Hub.

Commissioner Piazza stated the County has received approximately \$613,000 from the opioid settlement as of now and will continue to receive more. He stated they will do a needs assessment in the County.

Legislator Nacerino noted that she supports creating a Stabilization Center in the County. She noted, as far as the Philipstown Hub, there is a process and criteria of eligibility for outside agencies to receive taxpayer funding.

Chairwoman Sayegh requested Commissioner Piazza provide clarification on what exactly a Stabilization Center is and the benefits.

Commissioner Piazza stated it is a voluntary diversion from the emergency room. He stated if people are in crisis they can go to an emergency room. He stated Putnam County does not have a mobile crisis team. He stated the consumers have asked for a Stabilization Center in the County, they do not want to have to go to Poughkeepsie. He stated for approximately the past ten years of our local government plan a Stabilization Center and a Mobile Crisis Team have been the number one (1) request on the Needs Assessment. He stated an Officer can encourage a person to go the Stabilization Center, but they cannot force a person to go. He stated the Stabilization Center has a Clinical Staff, Social Workers and Nurses. He stated there is not a psychiatrist and they will not do a detox there, but can help the individuals to go to a place that does do that, as an example Arms Acres. He stated it is a 23-hour safe space for someone in crisis. He stated additionally there would be showering facility and food available.

Legislator Montgomery stated her concern is what happens after the 23 hours in the Stabilization Center. She stated she requested funding for the Hub. She stated unfortunately no funding was provided.

Legislator Gouldman questioned if children and adults are separated and why is there a 23 hour limit.

Commissioner Piazza stated when it was originally formulated there was no State funding available. He explained in order to receive Medicaid funding, which is the major funding source, regulations had to be set. He stated the billing is done on a 23.5 hour basis.

Ms. Pearsall stated she is a Director of Clinical Services in a residence home in Garrison. She stated that she found with the kids that a Stabilization Center would be wonderful as a first stop.

She stated she agrees with Legislator Montgomery in that there needs to be more. She spoke to an innovative idea that she has heard and believes would be effective. She stated it is a psycho education of the community. She stated helping the community to understand this while creating a foundation of a vocabulary for help could be really beneficial as well.

Commissioner Piazza stated there would be a role to be played by the other community agencies. He stated there needs to be a unified involvement for the benefit of the client.

Liza Szpylka from CoveCare Center stated her agreement with the value of a collaboration and coordination between all of the agencies to serve the client.

Jean Kelly member of the Putnam Valley Democratic Committee questioned if there is any health care incentive for nurses and doctors who have walked away from their professions as a result of what they went through during COVID-19.

Commissioner Piazza stated there is no special program that he is aware of at the present time. He stated it is a good recommendation.

Chairwoman Sayegh expressed her appreciation to Commissioner Piazza and to everyone who participated in the discussion.

The meeting was called to order at 7:00 P.M. by Chairwoman Sayegh who requested that Legislator Addonizio lead in the Pledge of Allegiance. Upon roll call Legislator Addonizio and Chairwoman Sayegh were present. Legislator Jonke was absent. Legislator Albano sat in place of Legislator Jonke.

Item #3 - Approval/Appointment/Board of Health/Heiber

Legislator Sullivan stated he knows Dr. Heiber who is a veterinarian in Mahopac. He stated Dr. Heiber is community minded and is a great addition to the Board.

Chairwoman Sayegh noted that Dr. Heiber is part of the group that does the rabies vaccination clinic with the County.

Legislative Counsel Robert Firriolo clarified that Dr. Heiber cannot take Dr. Philips place on the Board of Health, because Dr. Heiber is a veterinarian, not a physician, which was the role Dr. Philips was filling on the Board. He noted that Dr. Heiber can fill another vacancy on the Board.

Chairwoman Sayegh stated the Board is still accepting applications.

Chairwoman Sayegh made a motion to approve Appointment/Board of Health/Heiber; Seconded by Legislator Addonizio. All in favor.

Item #4 - Approval/Appointments/Mental Health Community Services Board

Chairwoman Sayegh made a motion to waive the rules and accept the additional, which was a revised request from County Executive Odell to appoint eight (8) members to the Mental Health Community Services Board.

Chairwoman Sayegh stated each candidate provided detailed resumes. She read the names of each candidate.

Legislator Nacerino stated she appreciates receiving the resumes but is concerned with having the addresses and contact information of the candidates. She requested that everyone treat this personal information with care.

Chairwoman Sayegh questioned Legislative Counsel if resumes are private information.

Legislative Counsel Firriolo stated there are provisions in the Public Officers Law on personal information such as name and addresses are not confidential as they can be found through various resources. He stated however, as a best practice, the Legislative Office redacts addresses and contact information of private citizens who are volunteering, just as a way to protect personal privacy. He stated this information can still be obtained via a FOIL (Freedom of Information Law) request.

Chairwoman Sayegh stated she understands the Legislature having the resumes on file and available in the Legislative Office, however she wonders if these resumes should be online for public viewing. She stated these resumes have a good deal of personal information.

Legislator Albano stated the Legislature could elect not to have the resumes online.

Legislator Addonizio agreed.

Legislator Nacerino stated the Legislature has an obligation to protect volunteers' privacy.

Legislator Gouldman suggested having the volunteers only provide an email and phone number.

Chairwoman Sayegh stated the Legislature would benefit from knowing which Town they reside in.

Legislative Counsel Firriolo clarified that they still have to fill out the same disclosure forms that all volunteers must fill out, which has their address on it and can be obtained via FOIL.

Chairwoman Sayegh made a motion to approve the revised Appointments/Mental Health Community Services Board; Seconded by Legislator Albano. All in favor.

Legislator Addonizio requested clarification on the handling of these resumes moving forward.

Legislative Counsel Firriolo stated the resolution with their names and terms will be on the Legislative website, but not the resumes with personal information.

Item #5 - Approval/Budgetary Amendment 22A084/Youth Bureau/Revising Allocations to Green Chimneys, Arbor House, and Transitional Living Program

Chairwoman Sayegh made a motion to approve Budgetary Amendment 22A084; Seconded by Legislator Addonizio. All in favor.

1 **Calling on the State of New York to Continue to Pass-Thru Federal**
2 **Affordable Care Act Enhanced Federal Medicaid Assistance Percentage**
3 **Funds**

5 **WHEREAS**, the SFY 2024 State Budget proposal would end the Affordable Care Act
6 (ACA) enhanced Federal Medical Assistance Percentage (eFMAP) federal pass-thru to
7 counties and New York City; and
8

9 **WHEREAS**, the State is proposing to keep all of these federal savings going forward
10 and use them to cover further expansions of Medicaid eligibility and benefits and to
11 increase payments to health care providers; and
12

13 **WHEREAS**, the elimination of this ACA eFMAP federal pass-thru will require the 57
14 counties to spend at least \$280 million more in SFY 2024, and approximately \$1 billion
15 when New York City is included; and
16

17 **WHEREAS**, the SFY 2024 costs to counties and New York City are scheduled to grow
18 by 30 percent by SFY 2027; and
19

20 **WHEREAS**, it is the strong view of NYSAC that congress intended these federal
21 savings to be shared with counties proportional to the amount they contributed toward
22 the nonfederal Medicaid match; and
23

24 **WHEREAS**, since 2003, the state has shared the funds proportionally based on our
25 analysis of savings we have received during periods when an enhanced federal Medicaid
26 match was enacted by Congress; and
27

28 **WHEREAS**, enacted in 2011, the Medicaid statutory cap for all 62 counties is \$7.6
29 billion. The Medicaid statutory cap for the 57 counties outside of New York City is \$2.25
30 billion.; and
31

32 **WHEREAS**, starting in SFY 2014, New York began sharing these federal ACA savings
33 directly with counties. The savings for a year were provided by lowering the weekly
34 payments each county and NYC make to the state to support the State's Medicaid
35 program. Through February 1, 2023, the state continues to share the federal savings
36 from the ACA eFMAP with the 57 counties and NYC; and
37

38 **WHEREAS**, counties strongly disagree with the need to cut county funding so deeply
39 when the Governor's budget proposes to fully fund its own reserves two years ahead of
40 schedule de depositing \$5.4 billion into reserves before the end of SFY 2023, while also
41 projecting a general fund surplus of \$35 billion by the end of SFY 2024.

42 **NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED**, that the New York State Association of
43 Counties calls on the State to continue to share these federal funds with counties as has
44 been the precedent for over 20 years; and
45

46 **BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED**, that copies of this resolution be sent to the counties
47 of New York State encouraging member counties to enact similar resolutions; and

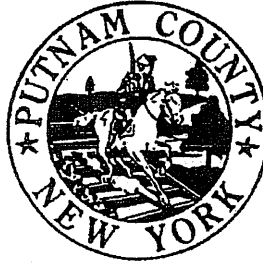

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


